**St. Paul's Lutheran Church.**  
English services will be held in St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church, corner Sixth and Market streets, at 11 a. m. to-morrow, and German services at 7:30 p. m., by Rev. F. W. E. Peschau, the pastor.

The cautionary Northwest signal was raised here this morning at 10:45 o'clock, and it was also ordered up at Charleston and Morehead. The storm at that hour was central in this State and was then moving Northeast.

Two of the finest steamers of the Clyde fleet are to be here this month, the *Delaware* and the *Yemassee*. They are both elegant passenger boats. The former sails from New York on the 10th and the latter on the 17th. Both boats sail hence for Fernandina.

**The New Engine.**  
The New Hanover Transit Company received a telegram yesterday stating that their new engine had been shipped and would be here in all probability about Wednesday next. The new road is being laid with the rails and the work is now about half done. Everything will be ready for the opening of the excursion season about the first of May.

**A Cold Wave Coming.**  
The Signal Office predicts a cold wave but the flag is not on the mast because the cautionary signal is already there. The outlook now is for nasty, dirty, cold weather but not weather cold enough to more than retard vegetation. The prediction is for rain and for a fall in temperature down to 42 degrees, by 8 o'clock to-morrow morning. Get in your fuel to-night if you would keep warm to-morrow.

**The Pig Puzzle.**

**The President Proclains.**  
President Harrison has issued a proclamation reciting the fact that April 30th will be the Centennial of Gen. Washington's first inauguration as President of the United States and calling on the people everywhere to attend divine service on that day "to implore the favor of God that the blessings of liberty, prosperity and peace may abide with us as a people and that His hand may lead us in paths of righteousness and good deeds." An excellent suggestion and one that will be pretty generally endorsed.

## New Passenger Steamship Line.

The Clyde line have concluded to put on a regular passenger service between New York, Wilmington and Fernandina, Fla. The *Delaware* and the *Yemassee*, two of the best ships in the fleet, large, roomy, comfortable boats, with excellent passenger accommodations, will be run regularly. These boats are well equipped, and well commanded and are both swift sailers. This new line, it should be distinctly understood, is in addition to the regular freight line of steamers already running between this port and New York. If successful, and we feel sure it will be, it will be made a permanency.  
**The Jute Butt Trust Bait.**  
The indications now are that the backbone of the bagging trust has been broken right in two. The following tells about the sad accident, although particulars seem meagre. We clip it from the Charleston *News and Courier*:  
A prominent merchant of this city, *approprios* of the bagging trust and the corner in jute butts, said yesterday that he did not think the farmers would have anything to fear from the bagging manufacturers next season. Even if a bagging trust had been formed for the purpose of squeezing money out of the farmers he did not think that they would accomplish anything by it, because the farmers could retaliate by keeping their cotton bade and thus paralyze the state of trade.  
Besides, the present condition of the bagging market made such a thing practically impossible, for the reason that the manufacturers have been and are still selling freely to the merchants. This time last year they would sell him no bagging at all and he had even been refused it as late as May. The result was that the bagging was all kept back and the price went up as high as 12 1/2 cents per yard.  
This year, however, things were very different. The manufacturers were selling freely and he, as well as other merchants, had bought largely, the prevailing price being 9 1/2 cents a yard. With the bagging already distributed among the merchants it would be practically impossible for the trust to get up a corner and force the price up on the farmer.

**They Were Related.**  
We had a good item yesterday about Mr. Cleveland's passing thro' Wilmington yesterday morning but we forgot to write it out. He stopped at the depot here 20 minutes. There were not many there to see him and among the number but few prominent people. This was due to the fact that although the morning papers had spoken of the fact that he would pass through here yesterday morning there was no mention of it in the REVIEW of the afternoon previous. Otherwise he would undoubtedly have been greeted by a large crowd. One old lady rushed panting up to the train just before it pulled out and grasping the ex-President by the hand she exclaimed: "Mr. Cleveland, my name is \_\_\_\_\_ and I feel sure that we are related. I have some near connections in your part of the country." "I haven't a doubt of it, madam," replied the ex-President gallantly, as he winked his eye at Miss S\_\_\_\_\_, with whom he had just previously been conversing. "I am sure that I have a great many relatives with your name." And just then the train pulled out and left the old lady to her blissful reflections.  
**The World's S. S. Convention.**  
As has already been stated by us Messrs. George Chadbourn and John C. Davis, of this city, have been chosen as two of the delegates to the World's Sunday School Convention, which meets in London in July. It will be a notable gathering of prominent Sunday School workers from all parts of the world. The American contingent will sail from New York in the steamship *Bohemia*, of the Cunard line, on Friday morning, June 19th, at 10 o'clock. The ship has been chartered for this special purpose and will carry none but the delegates, and such immediate relatives or friends as they may desire to accompany them. There are 401 delegates from this country, the representation being based upon the Congressional apportionment as to the lower house. The party will all stop at the Midland Hotel, in London, arrangements having already been made for their entertainment there. It is calculated that they will be absent about two months and after the Convention has closed there will be a series of entertainments for their benefit and excursion parties made up for various parts of Great Britain and the Continent.

Capt. A. D. Ingram, of the Clyde line steamer *Pioneer*, is the youngest captain in the fleet, and is the only one that has brought his steamer up the river after dark. He came in over the bar this morning at 2 o'clock and came up to the city without a pilot.
