STATE NEWS.

Greensboro Patriot: Adjutant General James D. Glenn will have charge of the military on the occasion of the Guilford battle celebration. He has invited as his aids Col. Parish, of the 3d, and Col. Anthony, of the 4th regiments.

Statesville Landmark: Mr. C. W. Grobe, the jeweler, who is uncommonly skillful with the pen, has written the Lord's Prayer on a card inside the size of a gold dollar. The writing is legible and there is room at the bottom of the circle to spare, not more than two-thirds of the space being occupied. Mr. Grobe did the work in thirty-five minutes without the aid of a magnifying glass.

Monroe Enquirer: The dwelling, kitchen and smoke house, of Mr. A. S. Crowell, in Goose Creek township, was destroyed by fire on last Thursday night. The fire originated in the kitchen and was discovered at 10 o'clock. The roof of the kitchen was then falling in, and the residence was on fire. Two or three beds, some bed clothes and a few other articles were saved. A lot of bacon, wheat, &c., was destroyed.

Charlotte Democrat: There is a press rumor that Mrs. Gen. T. J. Jackson has been offered the choice between the Charlotte and Richmond postoffices from the Harrison administration. Mills, carrying a load of love too heavy for single harness, went recently at midnight to the home of Mr. H. H. Gibbs and sang from a ladder to his lady love Miss Abbie Gibbs a love song under her window in the second story. The lovers met tenderly, ran away that night, and sought in hot haste the magistrate who soon pronounced them "man and wife."

He was found in the woods dead, with his gun and axe both in his hands, a tree which he had cut down having fallen upon him, apparently killing him instantly.
