A majority of the stock of the Atlanta Gas Company has been sold to the United States Gas Light Company, of Philadelphia, for \$520,000. The Atlanta Company was organized in 1854 with a capital of \$50,000.

In its notes about the approaching Centennial, the New York *Herald* says: "The Governors of North and South Carolina will both stay at the Metropolitan, so that there is not likely to be any time lost between drinks."

A colored church in Indianapolis is going to reproduce, on its own platform, the scenes of the inauguration of President Harrison, all the members of the Administration and their wives being represented in the show by members of the congregation.

The New York *Herald* tells us something new. It says that Fifth Avenue is the dividing line between East and West New York. We had always been under the impression that Broadway was the line and that the cross streets were numbered East and West from this street.

The Minneapolis street car companies are importing cowboys from Kansas City and other suburban towns to take the places of the striking car drivers and conductors. The cowboy conductors and drivers the companies hope will frighten off the strikers and at the same time draw custom.

The pool sellers of New York are happy. Judge Gildersleeve has decided that pool sellers on horse races only acted as commission merchants, and cannot under the present reading of the statutes be indicted and punished for violating the provisions of the Ives bill passed by the New York Legislature last year.

A. M. E. Robinson, of Keuka, Fla., who is an experienced fruit canner, claims to have discovered a process whereby oranges can be canned successfully. It is said that the cost would not be more than in canning peaches, that the laborers, labels and cases would cost about \$1.10 per case of two dozen. It takes four oranges of average size to fill a can.

The whipping of criminals is again proposed in the British Parliament. Fifty strokes for an adult offender and twenty-five for a boy is the limit, though a sentence may provide, for several whippings. The offences for which grown-up people may be flogged, under the bill, include the discharge of arms, etc., to injure or alarm the Queen; robbery, assault with intent to rob, etc., where the offender is armed with any dangerous or offensive weapon; garrotting, etc.; gross cases of rape, etc.; assaulting girls under the age of 15.

There were also nine young men up before the Mayor this morning on the charge of disorderly conduct but they were dismissed with a warning.

Audit and Finance.

The Board of Audit and Finance met in called session yesterday afternoon, pursuant to adjournment, to consider the estimates of the Board of Aldermen for current expenses for the present fiscal year. There were present, Mr. R. J. Jones, chairman, and Messrs. J. F. Maander, Wm. Calder, W. R. Kenan and John W. Hewett.

The chairman stated the purpose for which the meeting was called, and that the estimates in the aggregate amounted to \$101,896.40, exclusive of amount required to pay maturing bonds, coupons, interest and floating debt. After much discussion, the following resolution, submitted by Mr. Calder, was adopted:

Resolved, That the Chairman of this Board be requested to return to the Board of Aldermen their estimates of expenditures for the current year, with a detailed statement of the fixed expenditures of the city and an estimate of the expected income, including an increased levy of 25 per cent. on real estate and personal property to meet interest on railroad bonds, with the request that the Board of Aldermen revise their estimates or devise ways and means to meet them.

The Board then adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

The Easter Egg Hunt in St. John's Churchyard yesterday afternoon was a gala time for the little ones. There were nearly 200 of them present and they all had a good time.

It is thought that the W. O. & E. C. R. R. will have terminal facilities in the lower part of city, where there is a big bay in the river and a plenty of water.

Mr. N. Hullen and wife will leave here on May 8th for New York, where will take passage on the steamer *Elder*, which leaves there May 14th, for Germany.

A survey is to be begun to-morrow and Mr. Mashburn thinks, as do we, that the line will not be far from Bannerman's bridge, where it crosses the river. It is all of 35 miles by the county road from Burgaw to Jacksonville.

Building Fund of the Y. M. C. A.

A large and interesting meeting of the Y. M. C. A. was held at their rooms last night, to concert measures to raise the balance of the amount necessary to complete the building fund. It was stated that \$21,000 is now pledged and that the work will not be begun until \$25,000 is raised. A number of young men volunteered to take around subscription lists to raise the \$4,000 needed, and they were on the street to-day but had not reported at 4 o'clock.
