The *Passport* has not yet arrived here and it will be several days before she gets here. She is taking the inland route, and this will delay her somewhat. She is now the property of the Wilmington and Southport Steamboat Company, who have recently purchased her from Capt. T. J. Harper. This company is composed of gentlemen of means in this city and has recently been organized. The *Passport* will run the schedule recently outlined in the REVIEW, two trips each day between this city and Southport, touching at Harper's Pier.

Pender County Board of Health.

In accordance with proper notice this Board assembled at Burgaw on Monday, May 6th, 1889. Of the fifteen members all were present except one, Dr. L. L. Alexander. The object was to elect a County Superintendent of Health, in place of Dr. W. T. Ennett, resigned. Dr. S. S. Satchwell was elected to fill the vacancy.

The Board then adopted the following preamble and resolutions.
WHEREAS, That highly esteemed gentleman, and former resident of Pender, Dr. W. T. Ennett, ex-Superintendent of Health of Pender, and ex-President of the State Medical Society, has recently removed to Wilmington in order to continue the practice of his profession in that city, therefore

Resolved, That while we regret to lose from our county, our Board, and from the profession in Pender, so useful a citizen and so true a member of our Board and of our profession, we are glad of the opportunity, now presented, of endorsing him, and of recommending him to the people of Wilmington and of New Hanover county, as a gentleman, and a physician of acknowledged ability, skill and success in his practice.

Resolved, That we tender him our sincere sympathies in the affliction of the recent accident which still confines him to his sick room, and the warm expression of our hopes that he may soon be again in active professional harness.

Resolved, That a copy of this preamble and these resolutions be sent by our Secretary to him, to the papers of Wilmington for publication, and recorded in our minutes.
