

Homicide at Cronly.

A fatal stabbing affair is reported
as having taken place yesterday
morning between two white boys at
Cronly, in Columbus county, on the
Carolina Central Railroad, about 18
miles from this city. All that could
be learned of the unfortunate oc-
currence is that the two boys—John
Cook, aged about 17 years, and
Willie Mason, aged 15—engaged in
an altercation, during which Mason
used his knife, stabbing Cook in the
lower part of the body, and inflict-
ing a fatal wound. Young Cook
was taken to his home near the vil-
lage in a carriage, and died shortly
afterwards.




