STATE NEWS.

Winston Daily: It may not be generally known, but it is nevertheless true, that Winston has an altitude greater by 225 feet than Walnut Cove. We had thought before this that Walnut Cove was much higher than Winston, but such is not the case.

Durham Sun: John Smith, an employe at the Block and Shuttle Factory, about 10 o'clock yesterday morning, had the misfortune, while running a shuttle saw, to have his right hand caught in the machine. The second finger was cut entirely off and the others, with the thumb, badly lacerated.

Raleigh News and Observer: The Raleigh Savings Banks yesterday reached its second birthday. Its statement will be found elsewhere this morning. It has been in business just two years and from the start it has been steadily growing until now its business is on the very border of one hundred thousand dollars. The first statement published by the bank showed deposits to be \$17,708.46. Now there are nearly \$80,000.

Charlotte Chronicle: M. W. Crawford & Co. have made arrangements to open a shoe factory here. The output at first will be 36 pairs of shoes per day, which will be increased as trade demands. Mr. Crawford is from Davidson College, where he was engaged in the manufacture of harness. The establishment of this factory here revives the idea of a tannery in Charlotte. The old tannery here paid 25 per cent. With a harness and a shoe factory here, investment in a tannery ought to prove remunerative.

Charlotte News: A most lamentable state of affairs exists at River Bend, near Rozzell's Ferry, in the family of a farmer named Goodson. On Wednesday of last week his wife made up some salad from the young shoots of the pokeberry weed for dinner, and in this fact lies a tale of woe indeed. There were six children in the family and all partook of the salad very freely. On Thursday night one of the children was suddenly taken with sickness and died before daylight. Friday another died, and a third one breathed its last Sunday. All three are under the age of 13 years. Now the remaining three are sick in bed with precisely the same symptoms, and they too, will die.

Concord: A Concord had quite a chapter of accidents yesterday evening. While riding through Main street Dr. Herring was thrown from his bicycle and received a severe injury to his left arm. Beside being dislocated it was broken and crushed at the elbow so badly that amputation seemed inevitable. His physician, Dr. R. S. Young, believes he can save the arm from that calamity, though it is indeed badly injured. About the same time in the evening, little Ralph, son of Mr. Will Odell, made a narrow escape from instant death in the factory. It seems the little fellow had gone to the picker room to speak to the operator, and in some way his hand was caught and before the motion of the machinery could be stopped his arm was severely hurt. Fortunately no bones were broken.


