Lippincott's Magazine.  
The June number of Lippincott's  
contains the first of a series of  
papers of extraordinary interest.  
These are nothing less than the  
"Recollections of George W. Childs,"  
written from his own dictation by a  
personal friend. In the present  
paper Mr. Childs gives a sketch of  
his early life. "I owe my success,"  
says Mr. Childs, "to industry, tem-  
perance, and frugality." Many in-  
teresting personal reminiscences of  
great men, with whom Mr. Childs  
has enjoyed intimacy, are given,  
such as Longfellow, Irving, Motley,  
Tieknor, Hawthorne, Benton, Ban-  
croft, Lowell, and a host of others.  
In the next paper Mr. Childs will  
give his recollections of Gen. Grant.  
Gen. Lloyd Brice presents a very  
clever sketch, entitled "A Dream of  
Conquest." It is somewhat similar  
in idea to the famous "Battle of  
Dorking" and shows how easily  
New York city might be captured  
by a powerful naval force. There  
are other papers of much interest in  
the number and several fine, strik-  
ing poems.

Weekly Crop Bulletin.  
On the whole, the outlook may be  
said to be favorable, and with good  
rains, which all sections have proba-  
bly had by this time, an improve-  
ment will probably be noted in the  
next bulletin. That just issued by  
the North Carolina Weather Service,  
at Raleigh, has this to say:

The week just ended has been  
characterized by a deficiency of  
rainfall, an abnormally high tem-  
perature and an excessive amount  
of sunshine. Crops are beginning  
to show the effects of the dry season,  
especially late cotton, which is  
growing very slowly. Wheat gen-  
erally is reported in fine condition.  
Corn probably is in need of more  
rain. The prospect for a fine yield  
of fruit, especially peaches, still  
continues good. Trucks, has been  
somewhat injured in the Eastern  
portion of the State.

In the Eastern District the rainfall  
has been below the average gen-  
erally but slightly above in the northern  
portion. An excess of temperature  
and sunshine is reported with favor-  
able effect upon the general crop.  
Trucks is reported as suffering to  
some extent from the dry spell.

In the Central District there has  
been a marked deficiency of rainfall  
an excess of temperature and sun-  
shine with an unfavorable effect  
upon the general crop. Farmers are  
unable to transplant tobacco plants,  
of which there is an abundance. A  
great deal of rainfall, well distrib-  
uted, is much needed.

In the Western District a deficien-  
cy of rainfall, about an average  
temperature, and a slight excess of  
sunshine have had a rather unfa-  
vorable effect upon the general  
crops. Rain is needed badly. Pros-  
pects continues good for wheat and  
fall oats. Spring oats reported in  
poor condition from a number of  
places. Fruit generally looking well  
except grapes, which were some-  
what injured by the frost which oc-  
curred the first of the month.




