STATE NEWS.

Raleigh Visitor: Old six per cent. bonds to the amount of \$83,500 were funded at the Treasury to day into the new four per cent. consols. This is the largest batch that has been presented for some time.

Goldsboro Argus: From all sections we hear of much damage to crops from the recent heavy rains. —The death of Mrs. E. A. New, aged 75 years, occurred yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, after a lingering illness, at the home of her nephew, Mayor J. E. Peterson, in this city.

Selma Reporter: An old man named Olliv West was run over and killed Saturday night by a work train on the Wilson Short Cut at Four Oaks, as the train was backing in on the side track. —One of our public spirited citizens offers to give free a few desirable building lots to those who will improve them. Let us hear from the first who accepts.

Charlotte News: Weddington, the murderer of policeman Pierce, is to be hanged in this city on July 11th. —The marriage of Mr. E. T. Cansler and Miss Lillie Scott, at the First Presbyterian Church last night, was a social event of unusual brilliancy, and was witnessed by a large gathering of friends, the church being fairly crowded. —The undertakers were yesterday afternoon escorted to carriages by Mr. E. M. Andrews, and were driven around town. They visited the cotton factories, oil mills, water works, spoke and handle works, and other industrial plants. All were surprised at the magnitude of Charlotte's industries. One visitor said he had all ways heard of Charlotte as a live town, but he found it a great deal livelier than he had ever imagined.

Raleigh News and Observer: Parties in the city yesterday from Granville county brought information that the flood did great damage to crops in that county and drowned a number of horses and cattle. —The Governor has set July 11th as the day of execution of Will Weddington, sentenced to be hanged in Mecklenburg county for murder. He appealed to the Supreme Court and judgment was affirmed. —John D. Murphy, Esq., of Greenville, N. C., and B. C. Beckwith and W. J. Peele, Esq's, of this city, took the oath and were admitted to practice as attorneys in the United States Circuit Court yesterday. —The Governor has relieved David Bell, sentenced to be hung June 7th in Madison county. He is granted a respite till August 16th in order that an investigation may be made of certain allegations made in connection with the case.
