Handsome New Soda Fountain.

Messrs. Munds Bros. have just erected an elegant new soda fountain in their low-town store, 104 North Front street. It was manufactured by Lippincott, of Philadelphia, and is called the "Edelweiss." It is fitted with a marble base, with silver and onyx ornaments, and a mahogany cabinet, with bevel plate mirrors and lingere figures. It has patent coolers and porcelain syrup jars and the syrup therefrom does not come in contact with any kind of metal. There is a patent tumbler washer which is ornamented with prisms and fancy glass globes and lighted with gas. The fountain keeps the waters cold, night and day.
