Carr, Thad Jones, Sr. The officers will meet at Kenansville on the 6th day of August next.

The Accident on the C. C. R. R.  
The accident on the C. C. R. R. at the "Pinchgut" filling, does not interfere with the moving of the trains. A transfer is made there and the passenger trains arrive and depart as usual. None but the fireman was hurt and he was scalded, but not seriously, by the escaping steam as the engine went down into the cut. Six box cars were badly smashed. Col. Jones is now at the wreck with a working force and the track will probably be clear and open for trains on Monday. "Pinchgut" is about three miles this side of Polkton.

Encampment Notes.  
The Light Infantry had full dress parade and inspection last night. The company turned out with forty five men in ranks, and the inspection by the commanding officer, Captain John H. Daniel, shows that the men take a laudable pride in everything that pertains to the soldier and will well sustain the good record of the corps at the Encampment. The members were ordered to report at the armory at 4 p. m. Tuesday for the camp at Wrightsville.

The Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry will be the first company to go into camp. It will arrive here Tuesday morning. The other companies of the State Guard will arrive here Tuesday afternoon, at 5 o'clock, by special trains on the Wilmington & Weldon and Carolina Central Railroads, and will go through to the encampment grounds at Wrightsville without delay.

Twenty three coaches on the Wilmington & Weldon railroad and eighteen on the Carolina Central, will be required to transport the troops to the Encampment.

The Confederate Veterans met yesterday in the Court House at Burgaw and there was a big crowd present. The Duplin County Veterans' Association was organized, with Dr. K. J. Powers as President, Dr. R. T. Saunders as Secretary, J. P. Stringfield, Assistant Secretary; Dr. J. C. Shephard, Treasurer. A Vice President was named for each township as follows: Union, W. L. Rivenbark; Long Creek, A. J. McIntire; Grant, T. H. King; Rocky Point, D. H. Armstrong; Burgaw, R. N. Bloodworth; Columbia, A. C. Ward; Holly, J. W. Rowe; Caswell, J. R. Hawes; Grandy, J. P. Richards; Caintuck, A. Moore. Ex. Committee, John Harper, T. H. W. McIntire, A. E. McNeill, Robert Rivenbark and G. F. Walker. Ladies recommended to the State Association, Mrs. K. B. Powers and R. T. Saunders.

A committee was appointed to solicit subscriptions for the proposed Soldiers' Home, or such other measure as may be prepared and adopted for the benefit of indigent soldiers, and the sum of \$150 was soon subscribed.
