**Col. Jones is Dying.**  
As we write one of the most gallant spirits our good old State has ever known is quietly passing away to its final rest and its great reward. Col. L. C. Jones is dying, and will hardly live to greet another sun. This announcement will carry grief and distress to thousands of manly and womanly hearts. There is no one for whom our people as a whole will mourn more sincerely; none whose loss will be more severely felt and whose place will be more difficult to fill.

Col. Jones returned here last Monday from the scene of the accident near Polkton, where under his personal and energetic supervision the break in the road was repaired. He was unwell and went to bed and has remained there ever since. His condition soon became alarming and his family, then at his residence in Jonesboro, were telegraphed for and a special train sent for them. Col. Jones' wife and a son and daughter arrived promptly on this train and have been with him ever since. Drs. Wood and Bellamy were his physicians and they have exhausted all of the resources known to medical skill and science, unavailingly, to save his valuable life. Last night there was a sudden and alarming loss of vitality and the heart ceased almost to perform its functions but by great exertions a partial restoration was accomplished. There has since been no hope—beyond the hope that always remains as long as life continues in the body—and at almost any moment we may hear that his noble spirit has left its tenement of clay behind and has soared to another and a better world than this.

On motion of Capt. V. V. Richardson, the temporary organization was made permanent.
