A Double Shuffie.
Samuel G. Talbot, a printer who has recently been employed on the *Messenger*, attempted to shuffle off this mortal veil last Saturday night and then, through the kindly exertions of Dr. F. W. Potter, was shuffled back to life again when more than two thirds of the way on his journey to the unknown. He was found on the sidewalk on Third street, between Market and Dock, about 11.30 o'clock, by officer Mintz, of the Police Force, in a stupor from the effects of laudanum and was conveyed to the City Hall, when Dr. Potter was summoned. The good Doctor remained with him all night and after a hard struggle won the fight. It is said that he swallowed three ounces of laudanum. Talbot was well enough to get out this forenoon. It was a narrow shave for him this time.

Weather Crop Bulletin.
The reports of correspondents of the Weekly Crop Bulletin, published by the North Carolina Experiment Station and State Weather Service, cooperating with the United States Signal Service, show that there has been a large excess of rain fall, about an average temperature and very little sunshine during the week ending Friday, August 2d. Seventy per cent. of the correspondents report the effects of the weather upon the crops as unfavorable. Tobacco appears to have suffered more than any other crop. Cotton has not done well. Fruit in some sections is rotting. Freshets have been of frequent occurrence. The highest freshet in the Yadkin river in ten years, water 17 feet high at Hedrick's ferry, occurred during the week. Normal weekly rainfall for the State for July is about 1.25 inches. Average for the present week 4 inches. Excess 3.75 inches.

In the Eastern District there was an excess of rainfall, about an average temperature and little sunshine, with an injurious effect upon all crops. The weekly average rainfall for this district was 2.63 inches, giving an excess of 1.38 inches.

In the Central District there was a marked excess of rainfall, with about an average temperature and very little sunshine, with quite an injurious effect upon the crops. Sixty seven per cent. of the correspondents reporting unfavorably. The weekly rainfall was 4.49 inches, giving an excess of 3.24 inches.

Sixty four per cent. of the correspondents in the Western district report the effect of the weather upon the crops as injurious. The weekly rainfall in this district was 4.67 inches, giving an excess of 3.42 inches. The temperature was about the average, and there was very little sunshine.

A Sad Accident.

A very sad accident occurred at 6 o'clock last Saturday afternoon. Edwin T., youngest son of Mr. P. Donlan, a lad not yet nine years of age, fell into the river at the steamship wharf and was drowned. He had gone down to walk home with his father and was playing with some other boys when the accident occurred. As soon as he fell into the water the alarm was given by his companions and two larger boys, Masters Geo. D. Crow and Herbert McElver ran to the spot and gallantly jumped into the river to rescue him but he had disappeared. Search was at once made for the body and it was recovered, after having been more than an hour under the water. Dr. Wood was at hand when it was brought up by Larry Lowe, colored, and did all that he could to resuscitate him, but in vain. The remains were carried to the residence of his grief-stricken parents on North Front street. The funeral services took place yesterday afternoon and the interment was in Oakdale.
