This race decided the contest between the *Pirate* and the *Rosa* for the Latimer cup and it was awarded to the former. It was presented at the german last night, Mr. Geo. W. Kidder making a very appropriate speech and Mr. Giles responding in his usual pleasant manner.

The cup is a very handsome one, of solid silver, lined with gold, and was made to order by Tiffany & Co., of New York, for Commodore Latimer. It cost \$450.
