A newly-born child, probably not more than a week old, was found yesterday morning by officer White in Macomber's alley, in the Eastern part of the city, in a pile of trash. It was in such an advanced state of decomposition that Dr. Potter is unable to say whether it was white or colored, but he thinks the latter. It was a female. There is no clue and the police authorities are now searching for one.

Going to Lenoir.  
Rev. J. P. King leaves here to-night for Lenoir. He has been called to the charge of the Advent Church in that town and for the present will become its pastor. He has not permanently decided on remaining there but may take the field as a missionary. In this event he will continue to reside in Wilmington; otherwise his family will accompany him to Lenoir. Two of his daughters, Misses Rosie and Esther, will go with him to-night. Mr. King's congregation here part with him with a great deal of regret.

Weather Crop Bulletin.  
The reports of correspondents of the Weekly Crop Bulletin, published by the North Carolina Experiment Station and State Weather Service, cooperating with the United States Signal Service, show that there has been a marked excess of rainfall, with an injurious effect, upon crops, cotton and tobacco especially, for the week ending August 6th. Lowland crops have suffered. The temperature has been about the average and apparently has affected the general crop favorably. There has been little sunshine with a favorable effect upon the general crop. The weather has probably been a little cool for cotton. The average rainfall for the week was 3.41 inches. The normal weekly rainfall for this State for the month of August is about 1.34 inches. The excess for last week is 2.07 inches.

Pushing on the Work.  
Gen. M. P. Taylor, Assistant Engineer on the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railroad tells us that the track laying from this city has now progressed 14 miles - and that it is being continued at the rate of one-half or three-fourths of a mile per day. Some serious delay was encountered in getting through Jack's Bay, on account of there being so much water, but this has been surmounted and the work goes bravely on. The road will in all probability be far enough advanced to move the crops on Black River in October and November.

During the latter part of this week work will be begun on the large guano warehouse which is to be erected on the Company's property at Point Peter, opposite the city. This warehouse will be 140x50 feet, with a platform in front nearly 100 feet square. There will be tracks on either side, so that trains of cars may be run down to the river front. North of the warehouse a large dock, 75x225 feet, is also to be constructed.

These Be Strange Things.  
Much interest is being felt here, as well as elsewhere, in the reported results of the application of the "elixir" discovered by Dr. Brown Sequard, the eminent and aged American physician who has been so long resident at Paris. A week or so ago it was reported that Dr. Hammond had tried it with gratifying results and we find in Saturday's New York Star reports of its successful application at Cincinnati and Cleveland. The "elixir" is prepared from the glands of some young and healthy animal, reduced to a powder and then made up into a liquid and hypodermically injected into the forsarm of the patient. The injection, it is said, must be made not more than two hours after the death of the animal. Dr. Sequard is alleged to have just applied it to himself and all the physicians who have used it at all have also subjected themselves to its application. In the reports alluded to above, Dr. Robert Biggar, of the Cincinnati College, applied it to a colored man, 70 years of age, who was bent and crippled with rheumatism. In his case the injection was made in arms and legs and a few hours after he could walk with ease. At Cleveland Dr. Brainerd, one of the most eminent physicians in the city, applied it, without the patient's knowledge, to an old man 70 years of age, bedridden and sinking away, and the next day the old fellow got out of bed and walked a mile, saying that he felt twenty years younger. These things seem strange but they come to us with the stamp of truth upon them. We would like to report a trial of this "elixir" by some one or more of our city physicians.

Dr. Hammond, by the way, tells a New York reporter that the "elixir" is not a remedy, but merely a tonic, and that it would take a hundred years of experimenting to know anything about it.

This is the title of an organization which has just been perfected in this city. The corporators are Messrs. J. D. Smith, J. S. Allen, L. S. F. Brown, R. W. Hicks, T. B. Harris, DuB. Cutlar, Jr., W. G. Whitehead, H. L. Fennell, Geo. Sloan, J. C. Cox, A. B. Sandlin, J. T. Sholar, E. D. Sloan, C. W. Yates, R. W. Wallace, W. C. Jones, E. S. Tennent, Iredeil Meares, Chas. E. Borden, T. M. Dobson, E. Moore, G. G. Dewis and B. F. King.

The capital stock is placed at \$27,500 and may be increased to \$100,000. The par value of the shares is \$400. The Company propose to invest their capital stock in the purchase of real estate and personal property, with the view of selling same at a profit, and they may also make subscriptions to the capital stock of other companies.

Big Time at Switchback.  
The probabilities are that there will be an unusually large crowd present on Wrightsville Beach tomorrow afternoon and to-morrow night. The programme prepared by the Ocean View Railroad management is a very attractive one. There will be fireworks on a grand scale as soon as night sets in and the pyrotechnic display promises to be the most attractive we have ever had here. Those present will be treated also to another beautiful display, that of the moon rising out of the ocean, which will take place about 9 o'clock, after which dancing in the big pavilion on the beach and riding on the switchback, "by the light of the moon"—and a few other powerful illuminations, will be in order. The Germania Cornet Band will go down in the afternoon and at 8.30 will give a grand concert. There will also be target practice in the afternoon for a prize of \$30, and all receipts from this over \$20 will be given to the W. L. F. Half of the entire proceeds are to be devoted to the fund for founding a Confederate Home.

Chamber of Industry.  
The regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Industry will be held at the City Court room, at 8.15 o'clock, this evening. Matters of importance will be brought before the meeting and all members are urged to be present. It is also requested that all citizens who take an interest in the progress and development of our city will be present, as Mr. Arthur Arrington, Chief Secretary of the Southern Inter States Immigration Bureau, will be present and explain the workings of the Bureau.

We might say that there, is no doubt about the Bureau being already a success and already in a position to render material assistance to all sections that will take the proper steps to advertise their advantages to the outside world through this channel. In order to do this successfully it is necessary to form a local society in Wilmington that the work may be carried on systematically. It is proposed to form this local society to-night. It is also expected to form the New Hanover County Society to prepare the county exhibit for the industrial display at Raleigh, October 14th to 19th. It is important that a good exhibit of the mechanical, industrial and agricultural products of New Hanover county be sent to this display, as it is expected that a greater number of home-seekers seeking homes and capitalists seeking investments will be in Raleigh at that time than have ever been in North Carolina on any previous occasion. Now, progressive men of Wilmington, wake up and do your duty.
