STATE NEWS.

There was a fearful accident on the N. C. R. R. track near Durham on Sunday morning and the *Globe* gives this account of it: It was not yet daybreak when the party stepped off the train, but the faint light then present quickly showed the form of a man stretched out in the ditch near the track. He was bleeding profusely and was baldly bruised in his side, with both of his legs crushed. He was recognized as Arthur Burcham, a young married man who lives on a farm near Durham. Further up the track fragments of a human body were scattered over a distance of two hundred yards. At the bottom of a deep embankment was a mangled mass of flesh, with only the face left for recognition. It was easily identified as that of Calvin Holder, a young man about 24 years old, who had been seen with Burcham in Durham drinking the evening before. A careful examination of the ground and track on both sides of the scene of the accident and of the track in the direction of Durham was made. The conclusion arrived was that the two men killed were under the influence of liquor and while in this condition they had seated themselves on the track and there fallen asleep.

Charlotte News: The farmers attending court bring cheering accounts of the crop outlook. From present indications there will be the largest crop gathered this year that was ever known. Miss Mittie Kindley, of Mt. Pleasant, Cabarrus County, eloped from the Female College at Greensboro, last night, with Mr. Ed. Heilig, of Mt. Pleasant. Mr. Heilig assisted Miss Kindley out of a window and the two took the train for Salisbury, where they were married. There was a tremendous gathering of the colored people at the camp meeting near Iron Station yesterday and enough preachers were present to keep the journals hot. It was a great gathering, but the noticeable feature of the day was a civil rights sermon by a colored divine who came in on the train to day. He made one of the bitterest speeches against the whites that has yet been heard in this section, but our informant says it was received with enthusiasm by some and indifference by others. He told the negroes that they had the right to sit at a table with white folks, wherever and whenever they chose; that they were the equal of the whites and the time was coming when they would be recognized as such. "Not only this," said the preacher, "but the time is coming when a colored man will be President of the United States, and I expect to live to see that day come."
