The Board of Education and the Board of County Commissioners met in joint session yesterday to elect a Superintendent of Public Instruction for the county of New Hanover. Only two candidates were put in nomination, Capt. E. W. Manning and Col. James G. Burr. Capt. Manning received a majority of the votes cast and was declared elected.

The Board of Audit and Finance met yesterday afternoon in regular session. Present, Mr. R. J. Jones, chairman, and Messrs. Jno. W. Hewett and W. R. Kenan.

Coupons, 472 in number and amounting to \$6,214, were burned in the presence of the Board, the same having been redeemed and cancelled.

Bills for current expenses amounting to \$4,476.86 were also audited and approved.

The Gretna Green Affair.  
We clip the following from Sunday's issue of the *Charlotte Chronicle*:  
An elopement occurred a few days in New Hanover county, and the hero and heroine of a true love match are now in Charlotte, enjoying their honeymoon. The lady in the case is Miss Cornelia Grady, daughter of A. J. Grady, a wealthy farmer and ex-county commissioner of New Hanover county, and her husband is J. C. Herring, a contractor, of the same county. The newly married pair are now boarding with Dr. Halle, near the Lincolnton depot, and will make Charlotte their home.

Miss Grady's parents were wealthy and of high social rank, and her father opposed her marriage to the young contractor. But love laughs at locksmiths, and accordingly the young lady slipped from the house at daylight on Tuesday morning, and joined her betrothed, who was waiting with a horse and buggy at the end of the lane. Swift as horse-flesh could go, they sped to Castle Hayne, a little village on the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad, fourteen miles from Wilmington. A license had already been procured, and there, sitting in the buggy in front of the magistrate's office, the runaway couple were united in marriage at the break of day.

A boy was sent back to the house for the young lady's trunks, and he returned with them unopposed, as Miss Grady was of age. They newly wedded pair then went to Wilmington and from there came to Charlotte.

Mr. Herring has secured employment as contractor with Mr. Ahrens, and expresses himself as much pleased with Charlotte. He lived about four miles from Mr. Grady.

Board of Aldermen.  
The Board of Aldermen met yesterday in regular session. All the Aldermen were present, and Mayor Fowler was in the chair.

After the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, the Mayor announced that police officer Williams had been removed and George Gafford appointed in his place. The next business, he said, was the appeal of Sergeant Pugh, of the police force, but Alderman Hicks interposed with the report of the special committee on the Nutt street crossing of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad, reading a communication sent by the committee to the superintendent of the railroad company, and the reply thereto. He said the committee had received no more complaints and great improvement had been noted in the management of affairs at the Nutt street crossing.

The report of the committee was adopted, and on motion of Alderman Smith the committee was continued.

The case of Police Sergeant Pugh was then resumed and Alderman Hicks moved that the action of the Police Committee be sustained.

Alderman Smith said that Sergt. Pugh was absent and he did not think his (the Sergeant's) appeal should be acted upon in his absence. He (the Alderman) had looked over the ordinances and found that many were constantly violated, instancing smoking on the streets and attending political primaries.

The Mayor thought Sergt. Pugh was treating the Board with contempt in not being present. In reply to a question from Alderman Post, he stated that the sergeant had been fined for going into a bar-room.

The motion of Alderman Hicks, sustaining the report of the committee, was put to a vote and carried.

The Mayor suggested that the Police Committee revise the ordinances relating to the police.

The report of the Chief of the Fire Department was read, showing the condition of the department; that two small fires had occurred during the month, and that advertisement had been made for horses in place of those dead and disabled, but as yet he had not been able to get suitable ones. Also, had received estimates for a hook and ladder truck suitable for the department. The report was received, and the Mayor said the purchase of a truck would be made.

Application to rent Princess street market house was referred to the Market Committee.

Application for use of the City Hall on the 20th for a dance by the Phoenix Hose Reel Company was granted on condition that a drum be not beaten.

Several applications for positions on the police force were referred to committee.

The resignation of Police Sergeant Pugh was received and accepted.

Application of butchers to change the market hours and that stalls in the Front Street Market house be apportioned to dealers in fish and oysters and fruits and vegetables, requiring the removal of carts from the street in front of the market house, was referred to the Committee on Markets.

Alderman Hicks presented complaint of Messrs. Adrain & Vollers regarding obstruction by hucksters and others to the entrance of their warehouse in the Seaman's Home building.

Alderman Lane called attention to the failure to place electric lights where they had been ordered, and Alderman Post, in behalf of the Light Committee, said he had exhausted all efforts to get the company to put up the three additional lights. The company was preparing to move its plant and said that they would be able to supply additional lights next month.

Alderman Post moved that an appropriation of \$300 be made for Mr. Jas. W. King, as an acknowledgment of his service in preparing the tax book. Alderman Hicks seconded the motion. He had examined the book and found the work was done in a highly creditable manner, and it was so valuable now as a book of reference that he thought Mr. King should be rewarded for his tedious work.

Alderman Craft, while admitting

that the work was better than ever before, thought no appropriation should be made without reference to the Committee on Finance and offered a motion to this effect.

The Mayor said it was a valuable work and would save the city several hundred dollars.

Further discussion ensued, Messrs. Craft, Smith and Morton favoring reference to the Finance Committee, and Alderman's Craft's motion to so refer was finally adopted.

One of the gentlemen that will compose the fishing party for the Rocks on Thursday told us that if he had the luck fishing that he had in his dream last night he would bring us a fine bunch as he was pulling them up in his sleep all night, and this morning when he awoke he wanted fish so bad that he put out for the market and bought a bunch.

A Flattering Endorsement.  
At the regular meeting of the Pender County Board of Health, held at Burgaw yesterday, Dr. S. S. Satchwell was re-elected County Superintendent of Health for the next two years without opposition. This is a very flattering testimonial to this eminent physician, and one which his untiring and selfless labors in behalf of the welfare of the people of his county have justly entitled him. He is certainly the right man in the right place.

Superintendent of Health.  
A meeting of the New Hanover County Board of Health was held in the Mayor's office in the City Hall last night at 8 o'clock for the purpose of electing a Superintendent of Health, to serve for two years ending September 1st, 1891. Dr. F. W. Potter, the present incumbent, was unanimously elected.

The following resolution, introduced by Dr. Wood, was adopted, viz:

Resolved, That the New Hanover County Board of Health do hereby declare that all cesspools and privy sinks, being highly dangerous, should be abolished, and immediate steps taken to substitute an improvement. To this end the Board ask for a conference between a committee from this body and the Sanitary Committee of the Board of Aldermen.

The chairman appointed Drs. Wood, Burbank and Jewett upon said committee.

It was moved and carried that all meats or provisions of any kind condemned by the Superintendent of Health, be destroyed by fire in his presence, upon such public premises as he may designate.

County Commissioners.  
All the members of the Board of County Commissioners were present at the regular meeting held yesterday afternoon.

The Treasurer submitted his monthly report, showing balance on hand to the credit of the general fund, \$10,381.58; to credit of educational fund, \$10,265.21.

The Register of Deeds submitted monthly report of marriage licenses issued and exhibited Treasurer's receipts for \$11.40 received for same.

In the matter of Mrs. S. M. S. Hicks' property, it was ordered that the valuation of the lot on Block 102 be reduced from \$1,500 to \$1,100.

The Board completed the revision of the jury list and placed the names of the jurors in the jury box.

L. D. Cherry was appointed special surveyor to survey lands of W. E. Mayo, in Federal Point township, and Wm. Hansley was appointed special surveyor to survey lands entered by B. A. Carter, in Harnett township.

Order by the Board, that the clerk notify all magistrates whose term of office expired on the 1st of August, 1889, to return the Code of Civil Procedure, and all other books in their possession belonging to the county, to the Register of Deeds.

S. VanAuringe, clerk of Superior Court, reported the sum of \$50 collected for incorporating the American Pine Fibre Company and the Wilmington Investment Company during the month of August.

Ordered, that on account of physical disability M. Dowling be granted permission to peddle goods, wares, and merchandise without payment of county tax.
