The Chicago Times puts Marshall Field at the head of its list of Chicago millionaires, rating his worldly gear at a value of \$25,000,000. It puts Mr. P. D. Armour second on the list as the owner of \$20,000,000.

A funny scene occurred at the Hoffman House in New York on Thursday night. A big New Yorker and a little Texan got into a political dispute and the former's sneers at the South were met with a blow from an umbrella in the hands of the little Texan which drove the other's white tile clean down to his shoulders. This was the only blow passed.

The *National Democrat* is the name of a handsome eight page paper which has just gone into publication at Washington City. For the present it will be issued but once a week but we trust that it will grow and thrive so rapidly that a daily issue will become necessary. Mr. Edward Hudson is the editor and publisher. It should be sustained and supported by good Democrats everywhere for it is something sorely needed at the Capital.

A dispatch from St. Louis says: "Leading wholesale fruit dealers of St. Louis are at present considering the advisability of going into a combination with similar wholesale houses throughout the larger markets of this country for the purpose of controlling the Florida orange crop. Early developments in the matter are to be expected as the New York end of the proposed combination is pushing things vigorously, and has already secured cooperation in other cities. Investigation among St. Louis houses shows that a gigantic 'Orange Trust' is in progress."
