The Burgaw and Onslow Railroad.
We hear it stated that the Burgaw and Onslow people are expected out here from New York next week, and there is some pretty confident talk of what they will do. It is believed that this visit will presage the beginning of active work on the line. It is said that the company are large land holders; that they own some 50,000 acres in Onslow county. If so this shows the milk in the cocoanut. Their intention seems still to be to go to Swansboro, and it is reported that they will build a large hotel there, as a health and pleasure resort. If these things are so then it won't be long before a terminus for the road will be sought in Wilmington.
