Irrigation has raised the value of
some California land from \$7 an
acre to over \$500.

Coal and oil are found in every
county of Wyoming. The territo-
rial geologist thinks the coal fields
cover 30,000 square miles.

For the monument to Hendricks
in Indianapolis \$40,000 has been
subscribed. The statue has been
cast in Rome and will leave Italy
for America a few months hence.

It is estimated that the expense
of maintaining the prisons of the
United States amounts to \$75,000,000
a year; but that is only a small part
of the cost involved in the existence
of the criminal classes.

Registration for the coming city
election in Nashville, Tenn., shows
that over 4,000 voters, mostly col-
ored, neglected the duty, and are as a
consequence disfranchised. The
colored voters seemed generally in-
different.

Opposite the city of Peoria, Ill.,
on top of the bluff, has been dis-
covered the site of Fort Creve Coeur,
the Fort of the Broken Heart, built
by LaSalle in the year 1680. His-
torians have long disputed as to the
exact location of the fortification.

New York is to have a big tower
that will go the Eiffel tower at
Paris several times better. It is to
be 1,200 feet high, about 200 feet
higher than its rival across the wa-
ter, and will cost \$2,000,000. It is
understood that the top will be
leased by the U. S. Government as
an observatory.

The state of the gem market may
be thus described: The price of em-
eralds and rubies is yearly increas-
ing. Diamonds and white pearls
are not getting dearer. Black pearls
have been increasing steadily in
price for the last four or five years—
in fact, it is almost impossible to
supply the demand for them.

Two German athletes have ar-
rived in New York whose feats of
strength, it is said, will be a revela-
tion to the strong men of this coun-
try. One can lift 545 pounds with
his middle finger and can pass a
weight of 200 pounds slowly over
his head with one hand. The other
is credited with being able to foree-
a six inch nail with his bare hand
through a two inch plank.

Says Joaquin Miller in "The In-
dependent": "The copper mines of
Montana to-day are the most exten-
sive, productive and profitable in
the world. The deeper we go the
better they get," is the laconic and
ungrammatical statement all along
the top of the Rocky Mountains
away up here to the North. And
this applies to copper mines, silver
mines, gold mines and all sorts of
mines, indeed, in Montana."
