The certificates for original pensions issued during the quarter ended September 30, 1888, number 8,705; the number for the corresponding three months of 1889 was 13,660.

Evangelical churchmen in England are terrible alarmed at the prospect of a revival of the monastic system in the Anglican Church. The subject will be discussed at the next session of Convocation.

The purpose of George Gould's visit to London is said by one correspondent to be to unload all his father's elevated railway stock upon the English markets. His holdings are valued at \$30,000,000.

The Supreme Court of Iowa has decided in favor of the constitutionality of the prohibitory law of the State in authorizing the seizure of liquor kept for sale, even though it is sent from another State and is owned by persons living in such other State.

The Italians of New York have been notified by their Government that it will co-operate with them in every way to procure a suitable statue of Christopher Columbus for presentation to the city of New York. The statue will be of gigantic size, made by an Italian sculptor of Carrara marble, and will cost \$20,000. Premier Crispi has contributed to the project.

The Conde d'Eu, the husband of the Princess Imperial of Brazil, said in a speech at Pernambuco recently that the imperial family desired only the prosperity of Brazil, and that when the people signified by their votes that their presence retarded the progress of the country they would retire. This was in reply to certain recent Republican manifestoes.

The citizens of Taylorsville, Neb., recently tarred and feathered old Jason Mitchell and then rode him on a rail. Instead of resenting this treatment, Jason seemed to enjoy it. This puzzled the boys very much, until the old man sued twenty-five of them for one hundred dollars each, and got it. Then they began to see that Jason really had the most fun.

When Capt. Jones, the general superintendent of the great Carnegie Works at Bradocks, near Pittsburg, was buried last week, the men asked for a day's leave to attend the funeral, which was granted at a cost of \$50,000 to the company. The cost was owing to the chilling of the rolls, the banking up of the furnaces and the cooling of the tremendous machinery kept at a red heat day and night together with the loss of the product for the time consumed.
