 win.

Death of Mr. J. L. Barlow.
 Mr. Joseph L. Barlow, whom we
 spoke of yesterday as extremely ill
 at his residence in Richmond, died
 last night. The remains will be
 brought here for interment.

Mr. Barlow was, we think, about
 54 or 55 years of age. He was a
 native of the North but removed to
 Wilmington when a mere lad, where
 he resided until some seven or eight
 years ago, when he removed with
 his family to Richmond. He leaves
 a wife and a number of children,
 nearly all of whom are grown, to
 mourn their great loss.

First Presbyterian Church.
 Extensive repairs have been made
 to the interior of the First Presby-
 terian Church in this city and it
 will be thrown open for worship on
 Sunday. It has been closed ever
 since the last Sunday in July and
 in the meantime the decorators
 and artificers have been busy. The
 gallery has been cut away from the
 sides and confined to the rear of
 the church and the result is more
 light, more beauty and more sym-
 metry. The walls and ceiling have
 been beautifully painted and
 gilded by artificers from the North
 who are specialists in this line of
 work. A new rose window of stained
 glass and of exquisite design has
 been placed in the wall above
 the entrance and two large
 chandeliers, arranged for both
 electric lights and gas are suspended
 from the ceiling, taking the
 place of the lights which formerly
 sprang from gas jets arranged on the
 sides, front and rear. These chan-
 deliers are marvels of beauty and
 taste. Each has forty electric
 burners, with glass globes, and
 there are attached to each four
 compound gas burners, each studded
 with gas jets. Either gas or
 electricity can therefore be used in
 lighting the church. The congrega-
 tion, when they assemble on Sun-
 day morning for worship there for
 the first time in eleven weeks, will
 note with pleasure the many im-
 provements which have been made.

The C. F. & Y. V. R. R.
 Col. Julius A. Gray, President of
 the C. F. & Y. V. R. R., and Mr. John
 M. Rose, Secretary, were in the city
 yesterday and to-day. They are
 making preparations for opening
 the road to traffic to this city. About
 30 miles are now laid with iron and
 it will be completed through to
 Fayetteville in the time given out
 by us when work was first begun, by
 next January 1st. It is probable
 that the offices will be opened here
 for business by the first of Novem-
 ber, by which time it is thought that
 the new transfer steamer now build-
 ing will be completed.

As soon as the road is completed
 to Fayetteville a first class mail and
 passenger train will be put on, to
 run from Wilmington to Mt. Airy or
 the Western terminus of the road.
 As at present contemplated, this
 train will leave Wilmington at 6 a.
 m. daily, arrive at Fayetteville
 about 10 o'clock, and at Mt. Airy
 between 7 and 8 o'clock p. m. the
 same day, making the run in 13
 hours. A train from Bennettsville
 will run to connect with the through
 train between Wilmington and Mt.
 Airy.

It is probable that a branch road
 from this city to Southport will be
 begun early next year, the company
 expecting to establish a coaling sta-
 tion at that place.
