The coming German opera season at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York will consist of fifty subscription nights and seventeen matinees, beginning on the 27th of November and ending March 22d.

The Mahoneites in Virginia are calling very pathetically for "pap," but whether pap will come to their aid remains to be seen. If the Democrats could handle some of that boodle it would be a good thing for the people.

The Massachusetts Democracy are putting their Republican opponents to the proof by nominating for office men of superior qualifications and attainments. Professor William Everett, one of the coming men among the New Englanders, has been named for the Legislature by the Democrats of Quincy, the home of the Adamses.

The New York correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger says: "Though Ex-President Cleveland declined the chairmanship of the World's Fair committee on permanent organization, it is a very general sentiment in this city that he should be made the president of the Exposition when Congress shall have granted the requisite charter. He could scarcely decline that honor."

Search is now being made in Mexico for the buried treasure of Montezuma, estimated to be worth \$80,000,000. This immense wealth was secured by Emperor Guatimotzin, nephew of Montezuma, in 1520, to prevent it from again falling into the hands of Cortez and his followers, who had once before seized it, but who had lost it in the battle with the Aztecs on July 12th, 1520, when the Spaniards were driven from the City of Mexico.

The Jews of New York propose to erect a mission building to cost \$200,000, and a fair is to be held in aid of the project. It is said 25,000 Hebrew immigrants arrive in New York yearly, of whom 20,000 remain in the city. There are now about 100,000 of them in the downtown districts, the condition of a large proportion of whom it is the duty of their more fortunate and enlightened brethren to better. In the new building will be established a kindergarten, industrial classes, free lectures, libraries, and instruction in various departments.

These are brave words. They are from the *Charleston News and Courier*. It was a brutal crime and we hope that every man concerned, be he of high degree or low degree, may be meted out full justice:

The story of an outrageous crime, which was committed in Georgia on Thursday, was told in a dozen lines in the dispatches published yesterday. "William Moore, a negro train hand on the Savannah, Florida and Western Railroad, was taken from the train at Jesup by a posse of citizens and lynched." Moore had done nothing worthy of death. "While passing Jesup the day before, 'he had some words with a citizen, and as the train pulled out he threw a stone, which struck a spectator.' It is not stated that the 'spectator' was seriously injured. It is not even said that Moore was a notoriously bad man. It is said that he 'was of good character, and that the posse waited for his arrival, and 'taking him off the train made short work of him.' There may have been something peculiarly criminal in the conduct of the man who was so summarily put to death, but if so it is not referred to in the account of the killing. All the evidence that has been given to the public stamps the affair as a foul and brutal murder, and it is impossible to believe that it will be allowed to go unpunished.
