Maryland expects to produce 10,-
000,000 bushels of oysters this year.

One of the singular developments
in the growth of Southern industries
is the manufacture there of large
quantities of stoves for the North.

Miss Bruce, of New York, has
given \$50,000 to the Astronomical
Observatory of Harvard, to be de-
voted to the purchase of a telescope
for celestial photography.

The New York Star speaks rather
ambiguously of "the American
rebellion." The Star might be a little
more explicit. Does it mean the
"rebellion" of 1776 or that of 1861?

The recent advance in pig iron is
worth \$3,000 a day, it is estimated,
to Birmingham, Ala., in increased
profit on iron made in that vicinity.
Two more iron furnaces are to be
built near Birmingham.

The owner of the ostrich farm in
Lower California paid \$1,000 each
for his birds, and he has quite a
number of them. Twice a year their
feathers are plucked, and each
plucking is worth \$300.

New York city was in total dark-
ness on Monday night, on the most
frequented avenues and streets. The
two largest electric light companies
cut off their circuits, pending a de-
cision as to taking down or contin-
uing the wires on the streets.

A horrible accident occurred at
Cincinnati yesterday. A cable on
one of the inclined railways refused
to work properly and a car load of
passengers, nine in number, were
dashed down the incline. Five of the
nine were killed and all but one of
the other four severely injured.

It has often been reported that
the British army is largely com-
posed of undersized boys instead of
men, but the returns do not bear
out these statements. Of 202,761
men only 11,596 are under 19 years
of age, while 34 per cent are over 5
feet 8 inches in height.

A movement is on foot in St.
Petersburg for observing Sunday as
it is observed in the United States
and Great Britain. It is said that
1,200 St. Petersburg merchants have
already declared themselves willing
to keep their places of business
closed on the first day of the week.

The average number of fires in
New York is 2,800 a year, or about
seven a day. Of these one-half are
due to heating apparatus, chimneys,
stoves and boilers, and the other
half are due to electric lights, gas,
matches and the use of kerosene.
The number of incendiary fires in a
year in New York is about fifty.

The "Old Masters" Exhibition at
Birmingham, England, which has
just been closed after a prosperous
run of ten months, has enjoyed ex-
traordinary popularity. Within
that time no fewer than 650,000 per-
sons have visited it, a considerable
proportion of them being Sunday
visitors.

Yesterday was the second of the
State Fair and it was rendered mem-
orable by the marriage of Mr. W.
M. Bateman, of the Farmers' Al-
liance and Miss Josephine Knowles.
The couple and their attendants
were attired in suits and dresses
made of cotton bagging and North
Carolina plaids. The presents were
numerous and estimated to be worth
upwards of \$2,000.
