Chicago Courts have ruled that all city advertisements must be printed in English.

Over 3,000 American women in New York city have already signed a petition for the release of Mrs. Maybrick. It will go to the Princess of Wales, with a request that she present it to the Queen.

The widow of the late King Luis, of Portugal, will receive a yearly allowance of \$64,000, which will be reduced one-half if she lives abroad. Of course she has decided to remain in Lisbon.

The bronze doors for the Cathedral of Cologne are nearly ready. They represent the four ages of man, the four seasons, and the wise and foolish virgins, with exquisitely designed ornaments, consisting of coats of arms and groups of animals and plants.

The Protestant Episcopal churches of New York city propose to celebrate the first century of the denomination in New York by the erection of a building to be used as a general headquarters of missionary work of the denomination in the diocese. A site has been selected adjoining Calvary Church, on 4th avenue and 22d street. Two hundred thousand dollars is needed for the land and building.

Many men of high rank in Europe are engaged in trade. Prince Bismarck is an enthusiastic timber merchant and paper manufacturer. His powder mills are very profitable. The Duke of Fife is an active partner in a London bank. The new King of Portugal owns and runs the faience factory of Caldas Reinha. The royal manufactory of porcelain at Dresden furnishes a considerable portion of King Albert's private income, while the horse breeding establishment of the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin places him in the foremost rank of horse dealers in Europe.

The loss to California by forest fires this year is estimated at \$25,000,000 in the value of the timber destroyed, while the deforesting of the mountains works great harm to the agricultural interests. The responsibility for these terrible conflagrations is placed upon the sheep herders. The State's official foresters, and the mountaineers, who live in the high forests, affirm it. The herders drive their sheep upon land that does not belong to them. They eat feed that is not paid for, and require the service by burning down the forests through which they pass and in which they pasture their stock. The press of the State is naturally making a loud demand that this wanton destruction of property shall be stopped.
