There are 84,179 pupils in the public schools in New York city.

It is said that there are forty-eight languages and dialects spoken in Mexico.

It is said that a large hotel is to be established on the first platform of the Eiffel Tower, with concert and ball rooms and a restaurant open to the public.

About 2,300 miles of main for carrying natural gas have now been laid in this country, and the total capital invested in the business exceeds \$50,000,000.

Not including Alaska, Brazil is larger in extent than the United States. It possesses within its limits an area of 3,287,964 square miles, with a population of 12,383,375.

The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals in Switzerland has resolved to banish cats from the Republic on the ground that they are killing off the birds.

During 1889 slightly over a hundred million dollars' worth of gold has been dug from the earth on the four continents; the largest quantity came from Australia, California and South Africa.

A Democrat in Monaca County, Ia., was elected to the Legislature by a majority of one vote. If he had remained at home on the day of the election the result would have been a tie.

The salmon fisheries of British Columbia have been a source of great wealth to the province this year. The bark Tithares sailed for London last week from Victoria with 51,429 cases of salmon, valued at \$300,000.

The gala coach in which the Princess Sophie, recently married to the Crown Prince of Greece, rode to her wedding, was built for the Count de Chambord, in expectation of his coronation. The King of Greece bought the coach for 26,000 francs.

The German naval authorities are said to have been making experiments lately with a torpedo boat built of compressed paper. The vessel is eleven feet long, and was found to show great strength and more elasticity when rammed by another boat.

The first statue erected in this country to a workman will soon be unveiled in Sacramento. It is in honor of E. J. Stevens, late master mechanic of the Southern Pacific, who had for years been in charge of lumense railroad shops in Sacramento. The funds for the monument were contributed entirely by workmen.
