The Fire This Morning.

At a little before 8 o'clock this morning the alarm of fire was sounded. It came from the foot of Ches nut street and from the upper floor of a building occupied by Messrs. J. D. McEachern & Co. as a grain and feed store. There was a large lot of hay stored on this floor and it is presumed that the fire caught in some way from the chimney as it was near this that it was first discovered. The various arms of the Fire Department were promptly on hand but the flames spread so rapid-The building was flooded with water, however, and the fire was soon under control. With the exception of the hay and other feed in Messrs. McEachern & Co.'s store, the loss is less than might have been expected. It is more largely by water than by Co. were next above Messrs. Mc-Eachern & Co., and under the floor where the hay was stored. They were insured with Messrs. Smith & Boatwright, in the Providence Washington, of Providence, R. I. for \$500 and with Mr. A. A. Brown, in the St. Paul's, for \$500. This will probably cover the net loss on the stock. Mr. B. F. Keith, Jr., occu. pied the corner store. His stock was valued at between \$2,000 and \$2,500, on which there was insurance with Messrs. McEachern & Co. valued their stock n hand at between \$1,200 and \$1,300, and on this they had insurance with Mr. M. S. Willard, in the Sun Fire Insurance Co. of London, for \$1,000. Capt. C. D. Myers, Mr. H. McL Green and Mr. Geo. D. Parsley had offices above Mr. Keith's store and to announce that the succeeded in removing their effects. The building is of brick and was built nearly half a century ago by the late Mr. O. G. Parsley. It is the property now of the estate of the late Julius Samson. The walls are cracked and scarred in several places. It was insured with Messrs. Smith & Boatwright in the Liverpool, London & Globe for \$5,000, and this will amply cover the loss.


