According to the New York Star Mr. Henry W. Grady is a very sick man. He is threatened with pneumonia. He left New York on Sunday night for Atlanta, in a private car.

There is a big war by the city authorities on the electric wires in New York and nearly twelve miles of them were cut down on Sunday. Why it was found necessary to do the work on Sunday we are not told.

Queen Victoria is breaking down rapidly. She is lame from rheumatism and her mind is not as bright as it was. Since she learned that the Prince of Wales has an incurable disease she has failed rapidly.

Mr. Lew Henderson, a farmer of Madison county, sold in one of the warehouses in Asheville this week 3,500 pounds of leaf tobacco for \$1,404.80. He says he has over a thousand pounds more which he thinks will sell for even more per hundred.

Miss Maud Cottorn, who is described as a petite blonde, has been appointed Deputy Collector of the Seventh Indiana district. Her duty, as such, is to visit all the saloons and low dives within her jurisdiction and inspect the licenses of the proprietors.

The Brazilians are not "rebels," but "revolutionists." This is because they succeeded in their attempt to overthrow the existing government. Had they failed they would have been hung and stigmatized as traitors to "the best government the world ever saw."

A verdict was rendered yesterday in the Cronin trial at Chicago. John F. Beggs was found not guilty; John Kunze was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to three years, and Daniel Coughlin, Patrick O'Sullivan and Martin Burke were found guilty of murder and sentenced to imprisonment for life.

Judge Campbell, of Philadelphia, is the only survivor of President Pierce's cabinet, in which Ex-President Davis was Secretary of War, John Sherman is the only one of Mr. Davis' colleague in the Senate who is still in public life and Hamilton Hamlin is the sole surviving representative of Lincoln's first cabinet.

Gov. Lee, of Virginia, has explained to the Richmond Dispatch why he did not attend Mr. Davis' funeral. He says that "the Maryland and Virginia boundary line on the Potomac had reached that point that a prompt settlement of the question was absolutely necessary to prevent loss of property and life, and could not longer be postponed." We accept the amendment.

The influenza epidemic has reached this country. It has appeared in Boston and New York. It started in Russia and traveled thence West to Paris and London and South to Rome. It is said that there are 100,000 cases in Paris. In fact, everybody there is on a big sneeze. It visits and afflicts all classes and even royalty is not exempt. The Grand Duke Alexis has had a pretty bad attack of it. It is not necessarily fatal, only about two per cent. resulting disastrously. Some call it *le gruelle* and one or two of the most eminent physicians in Paris say that it is identical with *le dengue*, a disease which originated in Syria and which, by the way, has been known in this country, if we are not very much mistaken. The symptoms are a general lassitude, intense headache, an extreme soreness all over the body and the limbs and a dry throat, followed by fever and bronchial affections. It generally continues, on the average, from three to eight days. An eminent Parisian medico prescribes for it sulphate of quinine, tannin and opium. After all, isn't it very much like the old-time hay fever?

The Mayor had several cases before him to-day, all continued over from yesterday, and in all of which the defendants were discharged.

Sch. Hattie H. Baybour, Fletcher, cleared to-day for Porto Rico, with 237,533 feet lumber, valued at \$3,148.02; shipped by Messrs. S. & W. H. Northrop.

Capt. C. C. Morse, of Southport, was in the city to-day. He tells us that a surveying party is still at work for the Cape Fear and Cincinnati Railroad.

Walk up to the captain's office and settle. Gen. Manning, sheriff of the county, and Mr. W. A. Willson, city clerk and treasurer, are making up the list of property to be sold for taxes.

There has been a very diligent search hereabouts during the past few days for the bamboo vine—so called—with which to make up Christmas decorations in the churches. It is getting scarcer and scarcer every year.

Fire crackers are cheap this year. You can buy a whole box, 40 packs, for \$1.10. There are some smaller ones than these which come much cheaper, and then, too, there are larger ones which cost more money.

W. H. Nash is again at work in his barber shop, corner Front and Princess streets. He is assisted by his wife, who will have charge of the ladies' department and will wait on ladies at their residence. The ravages of the late fire have all been repaired and the shop is now in first class order.

Mr. Gibson James, of Maple Hill, Pender County, is in the city to-day. Among other things he brought down some 25 bales of dogtongue (vanilla) dried and in bales and ready for shipment to the tobacco factories. The weight of the bales runs from 550 to 650 pounds; in all, say 15,000 pounds of the weed.

Track laying on the Norfolk and Carolina R. R. was completed to-day. Twelve new engines of powerful horse power and provided with the latest improved machinery are included in the rolling stock.

Audit and Finance. The Board of Audit and Finance met in regular session yesterday afternoon. President: Mr. R. J. Jones, chairman, Mr. Wm. Calder and Mr. W. R. Kenan.

The action of the Board of Aldermen in granting a petition of Messrs. Parsley & Wiggins, for a fire alarm at corner of Fourth and Ash streets was adopted, but in regard to the application of the same parties for an additional fire hydrant in the vicinity, it was recommended that the fire hydrant now near the mill property be placed at the most available point outside of their yard.

It was ordered that it be recommended to the Public Building Committee that the steps in front of the Opera House be put in good condition. Also, the steps leading from the City Hall portico to the yard. Bills were audited and approved as follows: Current expenses, \$1,406.99.
