Queen Victoria took first prize of 100 guineas at the Birmingham cattle show with a short horn.
The Czar gets about 3,600 pounds of pure gold every year from his gold mines in Eastern Siberia.
The Hon. George Bancroft takes a long walk every pleasant afternoon, often with a volume of Shakespeare in his hand.

Baron Alphonse de Rothschild, of Paris, is preparing an elaborate catalogue of his wonderful collection of gems, mosaics and other works of art.

The City Council of New Orleans has passed a resolution to open any public square in the Southern metropolis for the reception of a monument to the late Mr. Davis.

Miss Ellen Green has been traveling for a Western paint house for the past eight years, and is considered one of the best paid and most successful drummers in the country.

This country will have a chance to see a son of Queen Victoria next year. The Duke of Connaught, the Queen's Third son, will visit Canada in May, after which he will make a tour of the United States.

An accomplished young man of London is employed by a fashionable stationer to write speeches for wedding breakfasts. In England neat and appropriate speeches are still expected of the bridegroom, and generally expected in vain so far as neatness and appropriateness are concerned.

Out of 380,000,000 of which the population of China is, according to the latest official statistics, composed, about one in ten is engaged in agriculture, one in 100 is a brick-layer or mason, one in 120 is a tailor, one in 140 a blacksmith and one in nine a washerman, while about one in 100 is a carpenter.

All must be well in Brazil now, for the Banco Internacional do Brazil, of Rio Janeiro, has telegraphed to the manager of its branch house in London that the customs and excise duties collected during the first half of December exceeded by \$87,000 the sum collected during the corresponding period last year. The despatch adds that everything throughout the Republic is proceeding satisfactorily.

Emperor Williams, of Germany, is a decidedly level-headed young man. - Despite his years there isn't a wiser ruler to day in all Europe. Here is an instance in point: Having heard that the President of the Rhine Province had refused to receive the miners' committee, on the ground that he already knew what the demands were, he immediately telegraphed to him a direct and peremptory order to receive the deputation and to report in full the men's statement of their grievances.

I recognize the fact that the war showed it to be impracticable, but this did not prove it to be wrong; and, now that it may not be again attempted, and that the union may promote the general welfare, it is needful that the truth, the whole truth, should be known, so that ermination and recrimination may forever cease, and then, on the basis of fraternity and faithful regard for the rights of the States, there may be written on the arch of the Union *esto perpetua*. - JEFFERSON DAVIS.

Some Ancient Currency.
Continental currency, once so plentiful that it took about a bushel of it to buy a breakfast, (this was in the days when the Revolutionary rebels, the ancestors of the Secession rebels, were fighting for the same principles of liberty championed by Mr. Davis and the entire South) has gone out of fashion now and rarely is a specimen seen. We have some before us now, the property of Mr. T. G. Landen, of this city. One is a bill issued by the "United Colonies," for \$7, issued under act of Congress passed at Baltimore in 1777, and signed by Jno. Taylor and L. Norris, and the other is a North Carolina currency bill for \$5, agreeable to an Act of Assembly passed at Smithfield, May 15th, 1770. This bill was signed by J. Hunt and John Taylor (not the other John) the first in black ink and the latter in red ink and the printing and signatures are all clear and distinct, unlike the other bill, on which everything is very indistinct. This State currency was printed in Wilmington, in 1779, by Hugh Walker.
