Congressman Bullock, of Florida,

Jane Franklin, colored, of New
York, is dead at the age of 107 years.

The oldest member of the French
Legion of Honor is a soldier ninety-
nine years old, the last survivor of
the battle of Trafalgar.

By the death of Sir Percy Florence
Shelley the title is removed from the
poet's direct line of descendants,
and it now goes to a cousin.

Congressman Goodnight, of the
Third Kentucky district, enjoys the
distinction of looking very much
like Postmaster-General Wanamaker.

Cardinal Bonaparte is one of the
oldest members of the Sacred Col-
lege. He is the son of Lucien Bona-
parte, brother of Napoleon I., and
is 75 years of age.

Miss Mahone, the daughter of
Gen. Mahone, is said to be making
quite a sensation in Washington
society. The old man made a big
sensation there last month.

A party is to start from San
Francisco for an island in the
Pacific ocean, below the equator,
to search for treasure which, accord-
ing to tradition, is buried there.

Mrs. Kennedy is Dead.

We deeply regret to learn of the
death of that venerable and good
lady, Mrs. C. G. Kennedy. She
died this morning, between 8 and 9
o'clock. She had been quite sick
for some time past and her great
age and infirmities rendered it more
than probable that the time was
near at hand when she would be
called to her great and well earned
reward.

Mrs. Kennedy was born in the
year 1800 and was therefore coeval
with the century. She was the
daughter of the late Dr. A. J. De
Rosset, who died about 30 years
ago at an advanced age and was a
descendant of one of the most illu-
strious families in the Cape Fear sec-
tion.

The deceased lady was married
about fifty years ago to Rev. W. M.
Kennedy, a preacher in the North
Carolina Conference, who was at
that time stationed in Wilmington
and who was a widower at the time.
Since then she has been a member
of the M. E. Church and her entire
life has been devoted to good deeds
and charitable actions. Ever since
we can remember she has been the
President of the Ladies' Benevolent
Society and the good that she has
done will never be known and sum-
marized on earth, although it is re-
corded elsewhere. She was the
friend of everybody in distress and
none knew her but to love and es-
teem and reverence this noble type
of a pure, lovely, Christian woman.

It is fitting, perhaps, that she
should be called hence at this time
when angels and humans alike are
proclaiming "Peace on earth, good
will to men." She has gone to her
great, her good, her nobly-earned
reward and to-day inherits that
"peace which passeth all under-
standing."
