Gov. Fowle has been censured for commencing the sentence of Bill Alexander, the condemned Charlotte burglar, to imprisonment for life. The Charlotte News published a pretty plain editorial on the subject.

The New York Tribune sets up a wail because there are so many ex-Confederate officers in Congress. And it is altogether because of the fact that they are on the Democratic side of the House. Hence these tears.

The five doctors who attended the late King of Portugal in his late illness presented bills aggregating \$100,000. This ought not to cause any great degree of surprise since one doctor presented a bill for \$100,000 to the executors of the late Samuel J. Tilden.

But few realize how small a State Connecticut really is. It is only about 70 miles one way and 90 another; say a space of ground extending from Wilmington to Goldsboro on the North and from the ocean to Lumberton and Fayetteville on the West.

The abuse of the pardoning power by the Executive of a State sometimes leads to direful results. Gov. Taylor, of Tennessee, pardoned five men sentenced to be hung for murder and those men are now on the warpath again, raising Cain generally. How many lives are to be sacrificed to the mistaken clemency of the Governor remains to be seen.

Says a Washington correspondent: "Gen. Nathaniel T. Banks goes wandering around the capitol these days like a ghost which can't find its way back. Not that he is thin and shadowy. He looks as large and as strong as he did twenty years ago, although 74 winters have made his thick thatch of hair and his moustache snowy white. But he seems not of this world—withdrawn, abstracted."

The death of an old colored man, Unka Santa Quanta, is announced as having occurred near Archer, Fla. He is said, on what is claimed as good authority, to have been 123 years old. He had during the course of his life five masters and six wives. His sixth wife gave birth to a child when he was 108 years of age. When very young he was captured on the West coast of Africa by a slaver fitted out by some of the godly abolitionists of Boston and was sold in Charleston.

The New York Mail and Express, a cantankerous radical sheet, owned by Elliot F. Shepard, who is principally remarkable for having married a female Vanderbilt, and for his uncompromising hatred of a section he has never seen and a people he has never known, has seen fit to accord a measure of unstinted praise to Grover Cleveland, speaking of him as not only a pure and able executive but as one who commands the respect of those most bitterly opposed to him. If this sort of thing continues we fear that we will have to drop Grover, and nominate his charming wife; but then we doubt if an angel would be eligible to the Presidency.

Among Republicans only the very rich are to be chosen. It is easy to see that it is Colonel Brice's Democracy, not his wealth, that is obnoxious to his opponents.
