Forecasts.

Water Works at Point Peter.

Mr. Jos. H. McRee, Resident Engineer of the C. F. & Y. V. R. R., is at work now on plans for a system of water works at the depot at Point Peter. A tower 40 feet high is to be erected and kept full of water and from this pipes are to lead out over the yard and the warehouses. There will be hydrants at various points and hose laid ready and in case of fire the pressure can be increased by means of the engine. The water will also be supplied to engines in the yard and be used in the offices and warehouses at the point.

Othello.

One of the largest audiences of the season was present at the Opera House last night to see Mr. R. D. McLean and Miss Marie Prescott in Othello and Iago. Those who expected a fine entertainment were not disappointed. Mr. McLean was every inch the Moor, proud, sullen, defiant and reserved in turns, only unbending when love held sway. Miss Prescott was an idealistic Iago. Her conception of the character was simply superb. We have never seen it surpassed. The company was well supported and we would be glad to have them come again and give other of the Shakspearian plays.

Horse and Buggy Missing.

Some one stole Mr. W. L. Parsley's horse and buggy about 6:15 o'clock this morning from in front of his residence, on Market street, between Seventh and Eighth. As usual it was sent there for him at that hour to take him to the mill. It is thought that some of the hands going out to work on the W. O. & E. C. R. R., may have taken them. As yet there is no clue.

LATER—The horse and buggy were found tied up near Little Bridge this forenoon and were brought to the city and returned to Mr. Jones' stable. It is not known who took them.

The Fire This Morning.

The alarm of fire was sounded this morning at about 1 o'clock. It was found to proceed from the extensive saw and planing mills of Messrs. James H. Chadbourn & Co. in the Northern part of the city. The fire was first discovered by the watchman and he tried hard to suppress it but his efforts were unavailing. An alarm was sent out and the department responded promptly but could not save the two mills, which were totally destroyed, but they kept the flames from spreading to other parts and the lumber was all saved. The mills were known as the Clarendon Steam Saw and Planing Mills. They were first erected in 1852 but have since been enlarged and improved. The capacity of the saw mill was about 25,000 feet per day. The loss foots up \$20,000, and there was insurance for \$9,500 distributed as follows: With Messrs. Northrop, Hodges & Taylor, \$1,500 in the Phoenix of Hartford; with Messrs. Atkinson & Manning, \$1,000 in the Imperial of London; \$1,000 in the City of London; \$1,000 in the Aetna, of Hartford; \$2,000 in the Hartford; \$2,000 in the North British and Mercantile, and \$1,000 in the Phoenix, of Brooklyn.

It is understood that Messrs. Chadbourn & Co. will at once rebuild.

The origin of the fire is unknown.

Two petty cases have occupied the time of the Criminal Court to-day up to 4 o'clock this afternoon.

County Commissioners.

The Board met yesterday in regular session. The County Treasurer submitted his report, showing a balance on hand to the credit of the general fund amounting to \$22,391.65; and to the educational fund \$4,673.01.

The Register of Deeds reported \$28.50 received as fees for marriage licenses issued during the month of December.

It was ordered by the Board that the bill rendered by John J. Fowler, Mayor of the city of Wilmington, against the county in favor of Jas. Elder, jailor, be allowed.

Applications for license to retail liquors to the number of 165, were granted; but the application of Mrs. A. S. Wessell, for license to retail at store corner of North Water and Mulberry streets, was refused.

S. VanAmringe, Clerk of the Superior Court, reported \$25 collected from the incorporators of the Universal Lubricant Company and paid to the County Treasurer for the school fund. Also, submitted annual report of moneys held in trust by him.

The poll taxes charged against H. M. Craig and Rev. Jas. W. Telfair were ordered remitted on account of physical disability.
