Surely the State of North Caro-  
lina must be a sovereign if Aliunde  
Joe Bradley thinks so, for it was he  
who delivered the opinion of the  
Supreme Court yesterday to this  
effect. Wm. E. Christian, a Virginian,  
held some bonds of the A. & N.  
C. R. R. to which the State had  
pledged its credit. The interest was  
not paid and Christian prayed the  
court to make the bonds be held a  
lien on the State's stock and in a  
contingency to have a receiver ap-  
pointed. The lower U. S. Court  
decided against Christian and the  
Supreme Court confirmed the de-  
cision. It is a very important case  
to other States as well as North  
Carolina. It establishes the sover-  
eignty of the State which, summed  
up in a few words, means that no  
State can be sued without its own  
consent and that no judgment  
against a State will lie. Vice Presi-  
dent Levi P. Morton can therefore  
make a bon fire of his ten millions  
of North Carolina special tax bonds,  
reputed by the State as illegally  
issued by the bunners who con-  
trolled the State during the dark  
days of so-called "Reconstruction."
