Apparently well grounded rumors
are afloat to the effect that big Ger-
many will stand up to little Portu-
gal's back in her attitude toward
Great Britain.

It is stated in London that Master
Abraham Lincoln, son of United
States Minister Lincoln, is slowly
dying from blood poisoning, the re-
sult of the drastic treatment to
which he has been subjected by
the French physicians who attend-
ed him at Versailles. This assertion,
it is said, is made upon indisputable
authority.

A man in New York on last Satur-
day morning accomplished the ex-
ceedingly difficult feat of cutting off
his own head. He was an ice man
and used a heavy ice axe, very sharp,
and weighing six pounds, to do the
work. He laid on his back and raised
the axe to the extent of his arm
and let it fall on his neck, which was
cut through to the backbone.

There is a woman now in a hospi-
tal at Philadelphia with a broken
neck and she will probably live for
years. The case puzzles the doctors.
She has no control over her head
and a frame will be made to hold it,
when she will go about her work as
usual. She fell from a cherry tree
last Summer. This is a severe warn-
ing to women who are addicted to
climbing cherry trees.

It is not altogether lovely with the
Republican majority in the House.
Whenever Reed cracks his whip
they fall into line but they are be-
ginning to complain. The New
York Star's correspondent at Wash-
ington, City says that Reed has adopted
his extreme measures without
consultation with the leaders. Mc-
Kinley and others are afraid he will
become too prominent a figure for
'92.

Some of our readers will remem-
ber a man by the name of N. Goff,
Jr. He was a brevet-Brig-Gen. in
the Union army and was in com-
mand here at one time during the
winter of 1865-6, and our people were
glad when he was relieved from
duty. This same Goff afterwards
located in West Virginia and went
into politics. He was the Republi-
can candidate for Governor the last
election and was apparently elected.
A contest ensued and the legislature
appointed an investigating com-
mittee. This committee sat for a
long time and discover a mass of
corruption. Negroes were imported
by the hundred to vote for Goff.
The committee reported in favor of
Fleming, the Democratic candidate
and a debate in the legislature en-
sued. Goff's counsel admitted that
negroes had been colonized to vote
for Goff. The legislature was to
have voted last Saturday when two
Democrats declared that they had
been offered heavy bribes to vote
for Goff. A vote was postponed and
an investigation ordered. It seems
reasonably sure that Goff will be
directly implicated, and then Mr.
Foraker will have congenial com-
pany in his enforced retirement.

Horrible News.
News of a dreadful disaster comes
to us from Washington City. Early
this morning the residence of Hon.
Benj. F. Tracy, Secretary of the
Navy, at 1634 I street, N. W., was
entirely destroyed by fire. Secre-
tary Tracy was himself taken from
the third floor by the firemen in an
unconscious condition but his wife
and daughter and two other ladies
lost their lives. The bodies were re-
covered by the firemen and were
identified. It is a horrible disaster
and will excite sympathy and pity
for the bereaved husband and father
all over this vast country.

Seven Carloads Not Enough.
The seven car-loads of rails for the
C. F. & Y. V. R. R. which arrived
here on Saturday are not sufficient
to complete the gap of four and a
quarter miles now open at the
upper end of the road, near Fayette-
ville. From which we can under-
stand it will be sufficient to lay only
about a mile and a quarter. More
is expected by rail this week, how-
ever, and will probably arrive in a
day or two. In addition to this
there are two cargoes afloat. More
is under way now than is necessary
to fill the gap but the surplus is
needed for various sidings on the
line and in the yard here. There
seems to be no reason to doubt that
the road will be ready for traffic on
15th instant.
