 State election General Mahone would  
 be grandly triumphant. As the Savan-  
 nah News remarks, that settles it, of  
 course. The 43,000 majority which the  
 Virginia Democrats piled up against  
 Mahone a few months ago is only an  
 indication that the Democrats are  
 going to be beaten out of their boots  
 next time. That seems to be Gen.  
 Rogers' idea.

 his pennant is known all over the  
 world.

The number of the members of the  
 House is 329. It was 330 before  
 Judge Kelley's death. One hundred  
 and sixty five is a quorum. The Rep-  
 ublicans have 168 members and the  
 Democrats 161. On the day Speaker  
 Reed made his unconstitutional ruling  
 the Republicans had only 161 present—  
 4 less than a quorum. The ruling  
 compelled the Democrats to contribute  
 toward making a quorum.

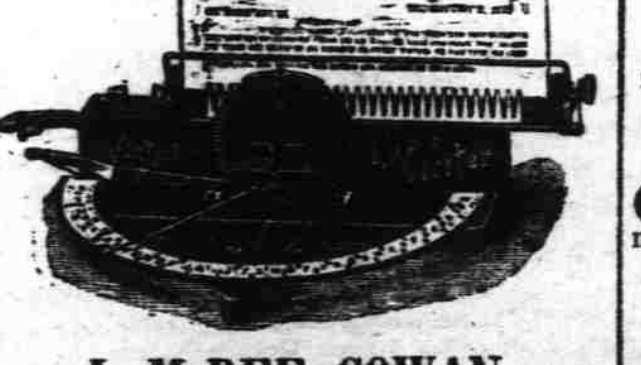
