There is a very animated and bitter contest going on over the appointment of a United States Judge in the new State of Washington. While it was yet a Territory Harrison appointed a friend named Hanford Chief Justice and ex-Congressman Calkins, of Indiana, an Associate Justice. It is said that Calkins took the place with the promise that if Washington became a state he should be made United States Circuit Judge. The promise was about to be kept, even though Hanford was an earnest candidate, but the enemies of both men declared that they were carpet-bag statesmen, and that such honors should be given older residents. This did not bother Harrison, however, but he held back the appointment, because some grave charges were made that Calkins was too much under the control of the Northern Pacific Railroad, for which corporation he had been an attorney. He is now seeking to disprove the charge, and there is no doubt but that Harrison will eventually keep his promise.

In Governor Buckner's biennial message to both Houses of the Kentucky Legislature he thus pointedly expresses himself on the subject of trusts: "Your attention is invited to the oppression resulting to the people from combination of capital under the name of 'trusts.' Fostered as they are by vicious legislation of the General Government, which forbids the masses of the people to seek the markets of the world, either for an advantageous sale of their commodities or the economical purchase of their supplies, resulting, as such partial legislation must necessarily do, in the rapid concentration of capital in the hands of the favored few at the expense of those whose industry earns it, it has become necessary for the legislative department of the State government to exhaust its constitutional power to protect the people from the insupportable extortions resulting from these hurtful combinations. These trusts assume various disguises, but they have the common object of enhancing the price of articles of prime necessity to the people, and at the same time of reducing the price of the commodities which the producer is forced to sell in order to provide for the necessities of those who are dependent upon him. Among other methods adopted, corporations from other States have leased productive oil fields, not for the sake of developing them, but for the purpose of preventing their development. All such combinations, under whatever disguise they appear, are opposed to public policy and inimical to the best interests of the State. They are actuated by a spirit of greed as injurious to the interests of society and as regardless of its rights as an organized system of brigandage and merit to be visited by the severest penalties. It will be the pleasing duty of the Executive to unite with the General Assembly in their patriotic purposes to repress the extravagant demands of individual greed to grow fat at the expense of the public; to keep within bounds the constant encroachments of corporate power, and to enact legislation which, granting exclusive privileges to none, will be just alike to every element of society. By such just measures alone can public welfare be promoted, and the liberties of a free public maintained."
