State Sunday School Convention.

The Convention yesterday after-
noon was called to order by the
President, Rev. Dr. Pritchard.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Mr.
Law, followed by devotional exer-
cises and Bible reading [by Rev.
Colin Shaw.

Further reports were then made
of the progress of the work in the
different counties, which showed
that there was a great awakening
upon this subject throughout the
State.

Prof. W. A. Blair spoke on "The
Art of Securing Attention" and Rev.
F. W. E. Peschan on "What to Do
for the Boys."

A Conference was then held on
the question as to "How to Have
Better Sunday Schools."

At the night session prayer was
offered by Rev. J. A. Spright, of
Raleigh, and a solo was sung by Miss
Mina Schwarz. This was followed
by a very interesting address by
Rev. W. S. Creasy on "The Religious
Use of the Imagination."

Mr. R. B. Reppard, of Savannah,
Ga., addressed the Convention on
the subject of "Teachers." He gave
the following as the duties:

1. Constant and strict punctuality.
 2. Thorough acquaintance with the lesson.
 3. Regular attendance on the Teachers meeting and the Concert.
 4. Go from the closet to the class.
 5. In teaching, be familiar, affectionate, practical, serious, earnest.
 6. Converse personally with each scholar respecting his soul. Merely asking the questions on the lessons will produce but little good.
 7. See that your instructions are enforced by your habitual life and conversation.
 8. Study the characters of your scholars—their tempers, habits, associations, &c., and adapt instruction accordingly.
 9. Visit the scholars at their homes, especially when they have been absent.
 10. Bear each scholar on your heart in daily, earnest prayer.
 11. Make their salvation the great object of all your instructions.
 12. Regard your office as second in importance to none, excepting that of the pastor and the parent.
 13. Cultivate a spirit of ardent piety, self-consecration, and a constant dependence on God for success.
- He commented on these as they were read by the congregation to whom he had distributed cards with these duties printed on them.
- He continued with an earnest appeal for consecration and devotion to the work of the Sunday School Teacher.
- Mr. Reynolds took the floor and

stated that \$800 were raised this
morning and he wanted it increased
to \$1,000. Subscriptions and cash
were given covering the needed
amount.

Mr. McPheeters, the Superintend-
ent of the Sunday School in the
N. C. State Penitentiary, told of the
work there.

THIS MORNING'S SESSION.

Convention was called to order this
morning by the President, Rev. Dr.
Pritchard.

Devotional exercises were con-
ducted by Rev. Mr. Ballard and
Messrs. H. N. Snow, William Rey-
nolds and B. G. Worth. This was
followed by a series of questions
propounded to Mr. Wm. Reynolds
and answered by him with wonder-
ful ease and facility. Prof. G. T.
Adams then spoke on "The Art of
Questioning."
