Gen. Francis E. Spinner writes from Jacksonville that the cancer on his face is rapidly growing worse, and it is not at all likely that his life will be spared much longer.

The young Chinese Emperor has insisted upon the closing of gambling establishments in Peking and is trying to cut down expenses connected with the government administration.

There is a new Eiffel tower on the banks of the Neva, near St. Petersburg, constructed entirely of 10,000 blocks of ice, with restaurants, observation platforms and other attractions. It is 150 feet high.

The receipts of cotton at this port for the week ending with yesterday foot up 385 bales, against 957 bales for corresponding week last year, a decrease of 572 bales. The receipts of the crop year to date foot up 131,042 bales, against 146,488 to same date last year, a decrease of 15,446 bales.

Vance, of North Carolina, are aids to the General commanding.
