The Atlanta Constitution publishes the preferences of thirteen hundred Georgia Democrats for Governor or to succeed General Gordon, and, strange to say, every man didn't vote for himself.

The talk now among the Canadians is for annexation to the United States. Better wait until we get an honest Democratic Administration or it may be a jump from the frying pan into the fire.

The heaviest tax payer in Prussia is Krupp, the gun maker, who is assessed this year upon an income of \$1,400,000, an increase of \$300,000 over 1889. A fine example this, to some of the Kruppible statesmen in this country.
