The Arkansas Hot Springs, as is generally known, are on Government reservation property, and according to an investigation just made at the instance of the interior department, site privileges, which the Government gives away with a generous hand, would command a rental of \$20,000 or more. As if that were not bad enough, nine of the bath houses are in an association which fixes prices and apportions profits, four of them charging high er rates than those specified by the department.

The American Forestry Association is proving that it is not merely an ornamental Society, but that it was organized for service. An urgent memorial has been addressed to Congress, asking that something be done at once to preserve the forests of the public domain. The fact is well known that many million dollars' worth of timber is destroyed by fire and stolen by thieves each year, the estimate being that an annual loss of \$10,000,000 is sustained in this way. No attention, worthy of this important matter, has, been paid to it, and Congress should promptly take such action as is necessary to preserve the forests.

New York's State Commission in lunacy comes out strongly in opposition to county care for the insane, and in favor of State institutions. A quarter of a century ago county houses were advocated, on theoretical ground, chiefly because it was thought to be an advantage to put the patient in the country, and not to gather a large number in a single years, however, is wholly in tavor of State institutions; indeed, the patients in county houses are very likely to be made worse by carelessness, neglect or ignorant treatment; while large State institutions can and presents in its columns matter to interest and instruct all ages, classes and conditions for the care of insane patients.




