### New Machine Shops.

Another item in the industrial progress of Wilmington is the establishment here of a new foundry and machine shops. Capt. S. G. Skinner is at the head of the enterprise. The works are to be established at the foot of N. street and already some of the machinery has arrived and is being put in position. More of it is on the way and will soon be here. It is calculated to begin work in one month, say about the first of May. The machinery is all to be of the latest and most approved devices.

### The Merchants' Excursion.

The General Committee on the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley excursion met at the house of Col. F. W. Kerchner, and nearly every member was present.

The chairman of the Committee on Entertainment reported that every preparation was being made for the entertainment of our guests on the 16th and 17th of April, and that all would be in readiness at the appointed time.

The chairman of the Committee on Invitation reported that the invitations were ready and would be forwarded immediately.

The chairman of the Committee on Finance made his report, and stated that his committee had gone to work in earnest and were doing everything for the success of the celebration.

It was thought best to leave the time for the departure of the train from Mount Airy to the officials of the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley railroad, so it is more than probable that the excursionists will arrive here on the evening of the 15th of April.

After this the meeting adjourned. It was suggested that hereafter if a very large meeting of the committee was desired it would be expedient to hold it again at the house of Col. Kerchner.

Rev. Mr. Arnold announced at the services last night that a Mission will be held at St. Paul's from April 26 to May 7, conducted by the General Missioner of the "Parochial Missions Society", Rev. Gustav Arnold Carstensen, an eloquent, gifted and consecrated evangelist, who for several years past has conducted missions in all of the leading cities of the country with remarkable success. Mr. Arnold asked the co-operation of all church people in this effort to quicken spiritual life among us.

### A Gale of Wind.

We had a real gale here last night and this forenoon, from the Southwest. The cautionary signal was ordered up this morning but the halliards were fouled on the flag pole at the Signal office and the signals were raised on the pole at the Orton House. At noon the halliards had been cleared and the flags were raised at the Signal office. The order for the signal included Charleston and Morehead and it is said that there was a storm central in Tennessee, accompanied by rain.

### The Grand Jury Discharged.

The grand jury were discharged yesterday afternoon. They considered 20 bills and found 14 true bills and 6 not true. In addition they made 3 presentments. They visited the county jail, and reported it in good condition and the prisoners well cared for. They recommended that the new poor house be built of brick and fire proof and that special quarters for the insane be provided. In the meantime they suggest that comfortable quarters be provided at once for those now under the care of the county.

### Iron and Steel Coating.

Steamship *Fantita* is now on the ways at Capt. Skinner's shipyard where she is having some repairs made to her stern post, and where the hull is being painted, from stem to stern, with Messrs. Hanson & Smith's newly patented iron and steel coating. This is a mineral paint manufactured here by those gentlemen. They have kept the fact quiet, heretofore, because they wanted to give the coating a thorough test before allowing anything to be published about it. The tests have been made and have proved very satisfactory. The coating dries in one hour after it is put on and will not only keep the bottom of a vessel clear of barnacles and other sea growth, but will keep it from rusting and wood from the action of the water for twelve months. We understand that a factory on a large scale is to be established here next Summer for the manufacture of this paint.

At 8:15 o'clock Judge Meares was notified that they had agreed upon a verdict, and the jury came into court and through their foreman entered a verdict of not guilty. The verdict was received with applause by the spectators, which was with difficulty repressed by the officers of the court. Yates was released from custody and went to his home.
