There is no monthly magazine received by us that we welcome with more pleasure than *Belford's Magazine*. We like its fiction and admire its poetry, laugh at its wit and swear by its politics. The April number is here and it is as good as the best. "His Bosom Friend" is the title of the novel for the number. It is by Homer Greene and is very interesting. A fine paper is on "The Free Coinage of Silver" and while we do not agree with all of its premises we admire its logic. "Huxley in Private" is the first instalment of a series of articles on "Celebrated Men of the Day." It is by Julian Hawthorne and although it savors too much of the George W. Childs style of literature, still it is very fascinating reading. "Florence Campbell's Fate" and "The Bullet Hole" are pleasant little stories; "Communism in China and Corea" is well written and attractive; and "Books Worthy of Note" is very pleasant literary chat. Perhaps the best paper in the number is one entitled "Wanted: A Christian Confession of Faith."
