An Earnest Appeal.

The Central Baptist Church, (colored), have issued, through their pastor, Rev. L. T. Christmas, a very earnest appeal for help in their new church building. Their old church building was destroyed by fire in 1883. They now own a lot, corner Seventh and Red Cross streets, and have put up the brick walls. This has cost \$2,600 and they now owe on it \$500. A strong effort is to be made to pay this off and when it is done certain gentlemen have promised to help them towards the completion of the work. On the fourth Sunday in this month, to-morrow week, they will have reliable persons stationed at various localities and they earnestly solicit contributions, if not more than a dime or a nickel.

Rev. Dr. Deems.

Rev. Dr. Deems, of the Church of the Strangers of New York, and who was pastor of the Front Street Methodist Church in this city in 1857 and 1858 and Presiding Elder of the Wilmington District in 1859, '60, '61 and '62, on his way South stopped yesterday in our city, as was made known through the columns of the REVIEW, and visited a number of old-friends, the Wilmington Presbytery and Oakdale Cemetery. At night he preached to the delight of a large congregation at Grace M. E. Church, although it was not known generally in the community that he would preach as he did not consent to do so until late yesterday afternoon. His theme, an old and common expression, "He is good but not religious," was handled well and to the great delight of the congregation. A short while after finishing his discourse he left for the South on the W. C. & A. R. R.

Audit and Finance.

The Board of Audit and Finance met yesterday afternoon at the City Hall. All the members of the Board were present with the exception of Mr. J. F. Maunder.

Salaries for the year were fixed as follows: Mayor, \$1,200; City Clerk and Treasurer and Tax Collector, \$1,500; First Assistant Clerk, \$1,200; Commissioner Sinking Fund, \$400; Clerk Board of Audit and Finance, \$1,300; City Attorney, \$500; Clerk Police Department, \$400. Total \$7,700.

Appropriations for the departments of the city government were concurred in as follows: Sanitary, \$7,250; streets and wharves, \$12,850; survey of streets, \$600; police \$18,350; public buildings, \$3,200; city election, \$500; lights, \$9,850; feeding prisoners, \$700; markets, \$3,950; printing, stationary and advertising, \$300.

The appropriation for the city hospital, \$1,450, was reduced to \$1,350, and for the fire department, \$12,650 to \$12,330. Appropriation for miscellaneous and extraordinary \$1,000, was increased to \$1,250.

Consideration of appropriations for the Fire Alarm, for the Water Works, and for permanent street improvement, was deferred for the present.
