## STATE NEWS.

**Greensboro Workman:** For the past year there have been over 450 arrests made by the police of Greensboro, and the revenue resulting therefrom has been about \$1,100 over and above the expense of arrest.

**A. M. Turner,** general manager of a big farm in Martin county, made quite a record last hunting season as a sportsman. He killed 37 wild turkeys, 315 wild ducks, 13 deers, 20 foxes, 7 otters, 3 beavers, 17 coons, 10 possums, and a large number of partridges, squirrels and rabbits. It is said also that he catches a bushel of fish every day.

**Winston Daily:** About one hundred of the hands employed on the street railway went out on a strike this morning. Their grievance was that they wanted an advance of 25 cents per day for their work. They were receiving 75 cents but wanted one dollar. Being refused, they quit short off, but during the morning several returned and went to work. About all of the "strikers" this morning are colored men who were putting down cross-ties, rails, etc. Another force employed higher up the street refused to join the crowd.

**Asheville Citizen:** Geo. Higgins, a well known colored man driving for J. E. Reed, died suddenly at his home on North Main street yesterday afternoon, of heart disease. He was sitting talking to his daughter, and fell over, dying in less than a minute. —Horace Greeley Westfall, son of T. C. Westfall, has been missing from a home since Thursday. He left his father's house on Chestnut street Thursday afternoon. The missing boy is eighteen years old, six feet high, rather overgrown, and has light hair and eyes. He has often expressed a wish to leave Asheville, and go to some other place and it is supposed that is the reason he has gone.

**Raleigh News and Observer:** Pierre Cox, son of Gen. Cox, who is in New York studying medicine, is quite ill, suffering from a fall down an arway. —The annual exhibit of cattle and horses by the Wake County Cattle Club will take place May 15th. Arrangements will be made with the railroads for reduced rates. —Mr. John J. Christophers, who is now 87 years old, but quite active, met with an accident yesterday morning while on his way from the market house. While stepping from the street at Walker's corner to the pavement, he fell and received a painful blow above the left eye, and had his left hand hurt quite badly. He also complained of being injured inwardly.

**Charlotte News:** Mr. Samuel Younts, one of the most prominent men of Mecklenburg county, died at his home in Pineville, at 11:30 o'clock last Sunday, and was buried yesterday. Mr. Younts was the father of county commissioner, J. A. Younts and of Mr. W. E. Younts. He was 95 years old and had been sick for a long time. —The Cabarrus county Democrats are evidently taking time by the forelock. The township primaries have been called for May 24th, and the county convention for the 31st. This convention will name Cabarrus' choice of a candidate for Congress. Col. P. B. Means and Capt. S. B. Alexander are the rivals for the nomination.

**Charlotte Chronicle:** At 8 o'clock last night Rev. F. W. E. Peschau, of Wilmington, President of the North Carolina Synod, and Rev. T. S. Brown, of Charlotte, conducted a Lutheran service in Old Fellow's Hall, in the interest of the colored Lutheran Mission, of this city. During the services a young man was admitted by the holy rite of confirmation to membership in the Mission which has assumed the name of St. Paul's Colored Evangelical Church, of Charlotte. —On Sunday morning very interesting services were held in Lutheran Chapel at China Grove. The church was crowded from end to end, by a multitude that numbered not far from a thousand people. They had come to enjoy the divine services and to witness the solemn installation of the new pastor of Lutheran Chapel and Centre Grove Church, Rev. C. A. Marks, who was called to this charge several months ago, from Prosperity, S. C. Rev. Mr. Marks is a man of ability, a man of lovely Christian character, fine education and thoroughly consecrated to his work. He is rapidly winning increased love of his people. Rev. F. W. E. Peschau, President of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of North Carolina, and Rev. W. A. Lutz, of Enochville, conducted the installation services, and preached on the duties of a Christian minister. He delivered the charge to the people, setting forth the duties of a congregation towards its pastor.

The solemn service of installation was then held. The charge consists of two churches, Lutheran Chapel and Centre Grove, and numbers about 400 members, and offers Mr. Mark a fine field of labor and usefulness.
