There are said to be three or four ladies well known in London society who are determined to appear at the next meeting of the Coaching Club on horseback, astride.

The Swedish Oyster Culture Society is trying to climatize American oysters from Connecticut on the coast of the Province of Bahus. The young oysters seem to thrive well.

The Congress of Americanists will be held in Paris on the 14th of October. It will last four days and discuss numerous subjects relating to America in Pre-Columbian times, its history, archaeology, language, etc.

Russell A. Alger landed in Detroit at the close of the war without a cent. He now owns 2,000 square miles of pine land in Michigan and is worth \$20,000,000, and believes in tariff on lumber to "protect American workmen."

The sea island cotton crop in Florida for the coming season is already planted and is above the ground. It appears to be making a good stand. The acreage is larger than it was last year, and the planters are counting on a big crop, the weather permitting.

A pair of curled poplar logs were shipped to Germany from Swain county, in this State, each twelve feet long and six feet in diameter at the smaller end. These logs will be hewed and polished for exhibition at Berlin this year. The farmer who sold the logs was paid sixty dollars for each.

The Paris old soldiers' home, the Hotel des Invalides, will very likely soon be closed. The number of inmates has sunk from 3,000 to 280, and the Government thinks of closing the half-empty buildings and letting the old soldiers shift for themselves on pensions of 300 or 400 francs a year.

English men-of-war must be not only wonderfully but fearfully made. The opinion is published that no ironclad has been built during the last ten years which did not draw at least a foot more water than the Government provided for. The bow of one of the latest great ships, the Trafalgar, sinks 16 inches below its intended line.

Will Not Deliver.

Waddell, counsel for the company, has presented a demand for \$25,000 of the bonds voted by the city but it is understood that the authorities will refuse to deliver the bonds, on the ground that the conditions have not been complied with, and that the matter will go into the courts.

The March of Progress.
Messrs. Hall & Pearsall have purchased, from the Wilmington Investment Co., the property at the Northwest intersection of Front and Mulberry streets, running through to Nutt street, with a front on Mulberry. The price paid was \$7,000. The old shanties there are to be torn down and soon an elegant business structure will mark the site now covered by one of the greatest eye-sores in the city.

Southern Baptist Convention.
The Southern Baptist Convention will meet at Fort Worth, Texas, on Friday next, May 9th. Rev. Dr. Pritchard and Mr. D. L. Gore, of this city, will attend as delegates and will leave here on Monday night. There are 70 delegates in all from this State. Reduced rates have been made on the roads, and on Tuesday next an immense train full of delegates, made up of other trains converging at that point, will leave Atlanta for Fort Worth, and will run solid through to its destination. The Atlantic Coast Line and Seaboard Air Line will sell tickets at one fare for the round trip, good for 30 days. Excursions will be given to the delegates from Fort Worth to the City of Mexico and to San Francisco when the Convention shall have concluded its labors.

Death of Dr. Carr.
Dr. Thomas B. Carr, an old and highly esteemed resident of this city, died at 9:30 o'clock last night, at Clinton, where he had been residing for some months past in the hope of finding an improvement in his health. For many years past he has been practically an invalid, and almost blind. The remains will be brought here this evening and the internment will take place to-morrow but nothing definite as to the hour can be determined upon until the arrival here of Dr. Carr's son, Mr. Willie Carr, who is in charge of the remains.

Dr. Carr was, we think, about 65 years of age and came to Wilmington about 35 years ago from Canandaigua, N. Y. He married the oldest daughter of the late Mr. Isaac Northrop and practised dentistry here for many years and by close attention to business amassed quite a competence. Some years after the war he embarked largely in purchase of real estate here and built a number of substantial brick houses, among others the present Seaman's Home, which was built for the Society, but a depreciation in values ensued and Dr. Carr lost heavily on his investments. He has since been in declining health and incapacitated for business.

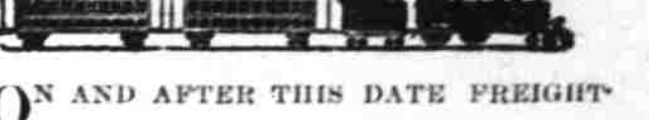
