Poole, of South Mills, Camden county, in the absence of Grand Master Joseph G. Brown, of Raleigh.

The Grand Officers present were Dr. John H. Poole, D. G. M.; John E. Bruton, Grand Warden; B. H. Woodell, Grand Secretary; Richard J. Jones, Grand Treasurer; W. A. Bobbitt and Rev. J. H. Cordon, Grand Representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge; John B. Deans, Grand Marshal; Jonathan White, Grand Conductor; W. D. Gaston, Grand Guardian; H. E. Heartt, Grand Herald; Rev. N. R. Richardson, Grand Chaplain.

The increase in membership being over forty-four per cent. over the previous year, and the increase in receipts to the Grand Lodge being over thirty-three per cent. The increase in the amount distributed for relief is over fifty per cent.
