State Medical Society.
This body, which has been in session this week at Oxford, adjourned on Thursday, and Drs. Wood and Thomas, who have been in attendance from this city, have returned. There were about 200 physicians in attendance.

The association adjourned to meet next year at Asheville. There were before the association 67 applicants for license, 9 of whom were colored men.

The annual oration was delivered by Dr. W. J. Jones, of Goldsboro. A complimentary ball was tendered the members of the Society at Armory Hall, Wednesday night, which was said to have been most highly enjoyed.

St. Paul's Evang. Luth. Church.
Among the many improvements—and they are indeed many—in building enterprises in the city and especially in our several beautiful church edifices, there are none more marked with excellence taste than those recently made in the interior decoration of St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church, on the corner of Sixth and Market streets. The work of improvement in this building has been in progress several weeks, during which time the regular religious services have been held in Luther Memorial Building. Work has so far advanced, however, toward completion that, although it is not yet entirely finished, services will be held there to-morrow, at the usual hour.

As one enters the vestibule the first thing to attract attention is an excellent oil cloth matting on the floor, while the plastering overhead has been removed and a substantial ceiling of native pine in oil colors has been substituted, and the walls elegantly frescoed with ornamental tiling and a ground work merging from fawn to light red colors, the whole bordered with bronze, green and gold.

Indeed, in whatever direction one looks, only pleasing and handsome views appear. The walls in the richest colors and shades of decorative art; the ceiling, with its majestic panels, that are frescoed in the most delicate and finely shaded colors, certainly present a most superb appearance and one is impressed with the fact that it is truly an artist's work, done in an artistic manner. There is perfect unity of detail running throughout the design, whether we look at the lower border work, upper fresco decorations, to the gothic arch window borders or to the choir and organ recess.

The ceiling and walls of the organ recess have also been frescoed in the same superior manner, and present a most highly elegant appearance.

For North Carolina, fair weather, except showers in northwest portion and stationary temperature. Local forecasts, from 8 a. m. to-day, for Wilmington and vicinity, fair weather.

Summer Schedule.
The Summer schedule of the Wilmington Seacoast railroad goes into effect on to-morrow (Sunday) June 1st. Trains will leave Wilmington 6.45 and 9.30 a. m., and 2.50, 5.00, 6.35 and 8.30 p. m. Leave Wrightsville Beach 7.40 and 10.25 a. m., and 4.00, 5.45, 7.30 and 10.00 p. m.

Sunday trains will leave Wilmington 9.30 a. m. and 2.50 p. m. Leave Wrightsville Beach 10.25 a. m. and 7.30 p. m.

The fare on the Wilmington Seacoast Railroad on Saturdays and Sundays will be 25 cents to the Hammocks and 35 cents to Ocean View, round trip. This will also be the fare on the supper train, leaving Wilmington at 6.35 p. m., daily except Sunday.

Counting the People.
The Eleventh Census of the United States will be taken during the month of June. The census enumerators will begin their work on Monday next, and will visit every house and ask questions concerning every person and every family in the United States. The questions that will be asked call for the name of every person residing in the United States on the first day of June, with the sex and age, and whether white, black, mulatto, quadroon, octoroon or Chinese, Japanese, or Indian. Inquiry will be made also of all persons as to whether they are single, married, widowed or divorced, and, if married, whether married during the census year. The place of birth of each person, and the place of birth of the father and mother of each person, will also be called for, as well as a statement as to the profession, trade, or occupation followed and the number of months unemployed during the census year. For all persons ten years of age or over a return must be made by the enumerators as to the number able to read and write, and also the number who can speak English. For those who cannot speak English the particular language or dialect spoken by them will be ascertained. For the children of school age, also, the number of months they attend school will be recorded by the census enumerators. In the case of mothers an inquiry will be made as to the number of children they have had, and the number of those living at the present time. This inquiry is to be made of all women who are or have been married, including all who are widows or have been divorced. Foreign-born males of adult age, that is, 21 years of age or over, will be asked as to the number of years they have been in the United States, and whether they are naturalized or have taken out naturalization papers. Of the head of each family visited the question will be asked as to the number of persons in the family, and whether his home is owned or hired; also, if owned, whether the home is free from mortgage incumbrance. If the head of the family is a farmer, similar inquiries will be made concerning the ownership of the farm. In addition to these inquiries, all of which are made on the population schedule, the law under which the census is taken makes provision for special inquiries concerning such of the population as may be mentally or physically defective in any respect, that is, insane, feeble-minded, deaf, blind, or crippled, or who may be temporarily disabled by sickness, disease, or accident at the time of the enumerator's visit. Certain special inquiries will also be made concerning inmates of prisons and reformatories and of charitable and benevolent institutions. Besides this, a statement will be called for concerning all persons who have died during the census year, giving their name, age, sex, occupation, and cause of death.

This official count of the people comes but once in ten years, and every family and every person should consider it to be a duty to answer the questions of the census enumerators willingly and promptly, so that definite and accurate information may be gained concerning the 65,000,000 people living
