W. W. Story, the American sculptor and poet, writes from Rome: "All that I have to say is that in my opinion the tax of 30 per cent. on foreign works of art is disgraceful in theory, unworthy of any great country, disastrous to art, and beneficial to none."

If the wishes of the executive committee of the Republican national committee are to prevail with the President, Samuel Fessenden, of Connecticut will succeed Mr. Clarkson as first assistant postmaster general. Mr. Fessenden is a member of the Republican national committee, and a hustler in politics. Clarkson is for Fessenden.

Duluth is to have a new \$500,000 theatre, to be known as the Midway Grand. It will be opened in December. When Mr. Proctor Knott made his speech in Congress predicting such a grand future for Duluth, he hardly imagined that in the year 1890 there would be opened in that city one of the finest theatres in the United States.

Boss Platt's candidacy for Senator Evans' seat in the United States Senate has caused considerable protest among inland New York Republican journals, while other candidates are not slow to show their heads. The latest rumor credits Secretary Tracy with a desire to be Senator Hisecock's colleague. In the event of a deadlock he might have some chance.

D. A. Brockett, a colored Democratic farmer, living near Tillery, in this State, is changing the order of things in that section and setting his neighbors a good example. It has been the custom of the farmers of Scotland Neck to buy hay from other markets, but Brockett is now supplying them with the finest clover hay ever seen in the market. He finds its production quite profitable.

During the session of the Republican Congressional Convention at Portland, Me., last Thursday, at which Speaker Reed was unanimously renominated, an unofficial ballot was taken among the delegates as to their preferences for President in 1892. Mr. Reed got 267 votes, President Harrison 4 and Secretary Blaine 2. It will be seen that Speaker Reed is a bigger man than President Harrison in Maine by a large majority.

It has been the public impression that Cooper Union was so endowed by Peter Cooper that it would not need more funds, but the applications for its advantages are so numerous that in order to accommodate all an increase of \$750,000 to the endowment would be needed. Certain enlargements are to be undertaken by the trustees this year, which will curtail the endowment funding income by \$2,500 a year. In consequence, they ask the public for more money.

The famous St. Bernard dogs are very carefully trained. A traveller who visited some of the monasteries of the monks of St. Bernard a few years ago found the monks teaching their dogs from the earliest stages of puppyhood. Not only is physical and mental training included in the teaching, but spiritual culture is by no means neglected. At meal time the dogs sit in a row, each with a tin dish before him containing his repast. Grace is said by one of the monks; the dogs sit motionless with bowed heads. Not one stirs until the "amen" is spoken.
