The following extract is from last Saturday's *Record*, the silver bill being then under consideration:

Mr. McClammy said:  
Mr. Speaker: It is said, as an argument against free coinage of silver, that Europe and other countries will dump their silver upon this country. Listening to this argument, I was induced to reflect that the countries would not dump their silver without consideration therefor. In other words, would not dump for the fun of it. If, then, they do for a consideration, what is that to be, save and accept it be our products outside of silver?

Must it not be the products of our farms, our mines, our manufactories? Then, deferentially, I submit:  
For our wheat let them dump.  
For our corn let them dump.  
Let them dump for our provisions.  
Let them dump for our wage-workers, in field and mine and shop.  
With this dump we can pay off our mortgages and overcome the influences depressing the energies of our people, and absorbing their resources to the point of bankruptcy.

## Last Night's Lecture.

Rev. Thomas Dixon, Jr., is a wonderful man, a true genius and a born orator. He is an accomplished artist in word painting, a wit without effort and without doubt one of the very first of public speakers in this country. His lecture on "Backbone" at the Opera House last night fully established all these facts. There was a large and highly appreciative audience present to listen to him, and he hung with eager delight upon his every word, at times spell-bound by his vivid and graphic description of men and things, and then convulsed with laughter at his brilliant scintillations of wit and funny imitations of grotesque characters. It was a lecture, and it was not a lecture, but rather, a powerful drama, in which all sorts of characters were represented, the scenes constantly shifting through his flashes of genius, and the whole based upon the great principle of moral "Backbone," or the courage to express and maintain fixed convictions. It was a treat that cannot be adequately described, and if the entire lecture were printed, it would lack the magnetism, the gesture, and the power of the burning words of the inimitable speaker to do the subject justice. Never was such a lecture delivered in Wilmington—certainly not within the last twenty-five years—and our people owe a debt of gratitude to Rev. R. E. Peele, pastor of Brooklyn Baptist Church, through whose efforts they had last night the inestimable privilege of listening to Rev. Thomas Dixon, Jr.

## Misses Burr and James' School.

The examination of the pupils of Misses Burr and James' school has been going on during the past week at the school house next North of St. John's Church. The result has been unusually gratifying, both to teachers and pupils. The thoroughness of the system established by these ladies has never been equalled by that of any private school for children in Wilmington, as is amply evidenced by the result of each year's examination. In this instance the accomplished principals feel amply repaid for their toil of the past year in the wonderful and remarkable proficiency displayed by their pupils. Little nine year olds answered with much precision and correction questions in regard to the geography of the various countries of the world and showed also great proficiency in arithmetical studies. Some even younger than these stood the test handsomely having been tried in spelling, not less than fifty words having been propounded to each. As for the higher classes the result was very gratifying there also. The examinations were in grammar, mental arithmetic and the higher branches.

The session of this excellent school will close next Monday evening with an entertainment by some of the primary class consisting of a little cantata, entitled "Bo Peep," at which the excelsior medals and other rewards will be given out.

## Notes from Pender.

(Reported for the Review.)

The public talk in Pender for several days has been the recent sickness and death of Mr. George A. Ramsey of Burgaw. As attorney of the Atlantic Coast Line he was well known in the eastern counties of the State through which that railroad line passes. Several of the employees of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad come up from Wilmington to Burgaw on Thursday evening to attend his funeral ceremony. He was buried in the public cemetery at Burgaw. Mr. Ramsey came to Pender some twelve or fifteen years ago from Mississippi and since then he has resided at Burgaw. He was born in Statesville, N. C. and belonged to the Ramsey family of that town. He died at Burgaw on Wednesday of this week, after being confined to his house for over a week. His brother from Statesville came down after his death and was present at the burial. He was married twice.

Crops were never in better condition in Pender, nor more promising. We have good seasons, in the way of refreshing rains. If it does not turn wet and parching dry weather does not come on in July, the indications are that Pender will be blessed with excellent crops this year. Our white people never worked so hard in all their lives as they are working this year; never did they depend so little on negro labor.

They are not inclined to give much attention to the distraction of politics until their crops are laid by. It is to be regretted, however, that candidates are too numerous to mention for all the county offices, including the legislature. The Democratic County Convention has been called to meet at Burgaw on the 4th of July, to appoint delegates to the Judicial and Congressional District Conventions. Of the candidates now in the field for Judge of this Judicial District Judge Boykin, seems to have the inside track.

Of course Pender presents an unbroken line and a strong front for the re-nomination to Congress of her talented and eloquent son, Chas. W. McClammy.
