One of the large map houses of Germany, commenting upon its notable new map of the Balkan Peninsula, said a while ago that, for the first time in the century of its existence, sufficient geographical data is now acressible to make it desirable to publish maps of the Balkan States on as large a scale as those of the rest of Europe.

Louisiana has a floating debt of nearly \$3,000,000, made up of bonds, interest compons unpaid, State war rants and certificates of indebtedness. So low is the credit of the State that these evidences of indebtedness have been selling at an average of about fifty cents on the dollar. It is now proposed by the New Orleans Stock Exchange that the State fund this indebtedness at half its face value in long-time bonds. It appears that most of this debt is held in the State, and a large portion of the certificates, bonds, etc., netted the State but little, if any, more than the value at which it is proposed to fund them. It is hoped to place these new bonds, which will be 4 per cent, at par or over, and in that way to restore the finances of the State to a reasonably healthy condition. New Orleans expects to benefit by this transaction, as its credit is intimately connected with that of the State. The city business, however, is done upon a purely cash basis, and it, therefore, has no floating debt.

"A change to the Democrats in ten districts, as compared with 1888, says the St. Louis Globe Democrat. (Rep.,) "would wrest the next House from the Republicans and put the Democrats in control. A hundred or two hundred votes here and there in a dozen close districts transferred from the Republican column to the Democratic next fall would break the Republican supremacy in the National Legisla ture for the second half of President Harrison's term and place the Democrats in power in the popular branch of Congress. The situation demands the earnest and critical attention of the party chieftains." The Globe Democrat may rest easy. They know that they cannot hold their majority paring, therefore, to make up for their impending losses by counting in a score of Republican candidates from the Southern States.
