Secretary Blaine is announced to preside at the alumni reunion at Washington and Jefferson College, June 24.

Frank A. Dennisop, colored, of Texas, is valedictorian of the graduating class of the Union College at Law, Chicago.

Mr. Blair's educational bill is to be reported favorably to the House, notwithstanding its defeat in the Senate.

Dr. D. Hayes Agnew, of Philadelphia, thinks the climatic changes which are taking place will in time bring the flora and animals of the tropics to flourish in the locality of New York.

Stanley says that the director of a Dutch house recently told him that his firm now has thirty steamers on the Upper Congo, and that they had bought \$1,500,000 worth of ivory in the last two years.

The question as to the penetrating power of the Mannlicher rifle that has been so frequently discussed was recently settled during a riot in Austria. The troops fired on the mob, and a subsequent examination of the wounds showed that in every case the bullets had passed completely through the bodies.

President Harrison in a letter of thanks for the address of the General Synod of the Reformed Church says: "Patriotism has always been associated with piety in your communion, and it is gratifying to believe that in all our churches the fear of God is allied with respect for human law and love for our free institutions."

The Chicago Times (Independent) calls attention to the fact that a Republican Congress at the very outset of its career proposes to expend nearly \$70,000,000 more than its Democratic predecessor appropriated for this year, and upwards of \$80,000,000 more than it appropriated for the year before. "How," asks the Times, "do the people relish such extravagance?"

The British census will be taken in 1891. The cost of the census of Great Britain in 1881 was £172,000 for a population of 26,000,000. For England and Wales the cost per 1,000 of the population was £4 15s. 5d. in 1861, rising to £5 5s. 7d. in 1871, and £6 12s. 6d. in 1881. The number of enumerators was nearly 35,000, and in 1891 the number will not be far short of 40,000.

The Chinese Government will provide shelter for the famous Nestorian tablet, which is the only remaining evidence of the attempt of missionaries to Christianize China in the seventh century. The inscription on the stone is partly theological and partly historical, showing the difficulties of propagating religion in that part of the world, and concluding with an ode of sixty six lines which is very flattering to the reigning dynasty.

The administration of the French navy has been wasteful enough to be scandalous. Under the prevailing system supplies have been granted on an absurdly lavish scale. For example, in some of the naval hospitals there were in stock eighteen nightcaps, forty-six night-shirts, and fifty sheets per patient. One store contained one kind of rope in sufficient quantity to last a century. During the past two years goods valued at nearly \$6,000,000 have been condemned as useless.

The Democrats of Missouri have determined to make tariff reform the principal issue in the approaching election for State officers and Congressmen. Tariff reform picnics will be held all over the State, and the services of Congressmen Mills, of Texas, and Breckinridge, of Kentucky, have been secured for seven speeches each during the month of July. These speeches will be delivered at accessible points, and will be heard by thousands of Missouri farmers of both parties, who are earnestly demanding tariff reform.

The third prize, which was for the highest number in punctuality and deportment, was awarded Miss Amy Harlow from the fifth class, she having earned the largest number of marks, next to the excelsior.

The prize on composition was awarded Miss Fannie Poisson, she having the highest marks. Then came the class prizes, which were given as follows: Miss Mary Dudley, 1st class; Miss Lila Everett, 2d class; Miss Mary Jewett, 3d class; Miss Harlow, 4th class.

That Music Festival.

Our esteemed contemporary, the Charlotte Chronicle, of the 15th inst., is unduly excited and needlessly alarmed at our remarks of the 13th, relative to the music festival in that good city and the suggestion that something of the kind might be held here next season. That it was merely a suggestion, a thought, was shown plainly by the context. There was nothing in the article to show that it was written by authority. It was the expression of a wish; not intended as a notice of a fact assured, although written in a vein of positiveness which might lead one who did not give the subject a little reflection to think otherwise. No did we intend to reflect in the least upon Charlotte or its festival, further than what we said regarding the day in the week when it commenced. That was certainly too late to commence such a festival, for, although it might have been all right for that city, it was so inconvenient for those living at a distance that many were deprived of the great and coveted privilege of attendance.

Now, we will say to the Chronicle, that we are in hearty accord with the people of Charlotte, so far as developing the musical possibilities of this State is concerned; that we honor and admire the pluck, energy, perseverance and self-sacrifice of her people in accomplishing so much for

the advancement of the divine science, and if words of ours would be of any value we would with all the strength of a good pair of lungs urge and encourage them to go on! keep the ball rolling! until the people are fully aroused and enthusiastic in the matter. We cheerfully give honor to Charlotte for bringing into existence the first music festival in North Carolina, but at the same time, we are reminded that the law of primogeniture don't amount to much in these United States, nor is there any rule in the patent or copyright laws of the country that gives Charlotte or any other city in the State exclusive jurisdiction in the matter of music festivals.

We did not, in our article, meditate any wrong to Charlotte musicians, but hoped we might help to encourage a musical feeling here. We do not wish to rob Charlotte of a single ray of her great glory, but would like to have a little fun down here by the seashore. Charlotte may have the Great State Festival, and we sincerely hope that it may be a complete triumph in every feature; while we will try and be content with a sort of a side show and will agree to not impinge in the least degree upon the greater claims of the first born.

We do not wonder nor do we doubt that people like to visit Charlotte. Her sons are noble, brave and chivalrous; her daughters beautiful, charming and accomplished, and her hospitality is generous without ostentation and frank without affectation, but there are people who like to come to Wilmington, some of whom fancy they find a few of these desirable qualities here. Charlotte is a live, go-ahead, wide-awake, keep-up-with-the-procession place and richly deserves the distinguished honor and high position she has attained. We glory in her success. We would not, in our efforts to build up the music of the Cape Fear, rob her of one note of the sweet music to which she has gained an inherent right, and we trust that she will not be angry if we should conclude to sing and toot our horns a little in a modest, quiet, unobtrusive way down here. If she will consent to this slight trespass upon her prerogative we may be able to have some amusement, make some advance in musical science, and in time be competent to assist in the Great State Festival in the good city of Charlotte. There were but a very few cities of the State which took an active part in the recent festival, and surely, it seems that we ought to have the privilege of drawing assistance from those places where the people did not, could not, or would not join with the people of Charlotte.
